OPENING CEREMONY DAY ONE

CALL TO ORDER

The convention was called to order by Chair Angela McArdle at 9:22 a.m. (all times Eastern).

The Chair answered the now traditional first **POINT OF ORDER** made by an unidentified delegate if taxation is theft and affirmed that taxation was indeed theft.

Technical Note

Due to a lack of monitors on the stage, it was extraordinarily difficult for the Convention Chair and Secretary to clearly hear the delegates on the floor. This, coupled with the venue lighting hampering ability of the persons on the stage to see, did result in some confusion with overlapping inquiries, Points of Order, and motions. Further, multiple "Requests for Information" and "Points of Parliamentary Inquiry" were couched incorrectly as "Points of Order." They are treated as what they were, not what they were called, and only actual Points of Order that required a ruling, from which an appeal could be taken, are included.

The Convention stood at ease while the Chair sought parliamentary advice as to the vote threshold required for this motion.

Andrew Chadderdon (MI) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that this motion would require a 7/8 vote as per the national Bylaws.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **NOT WELL-TAKEN** since these names were submitted by the affiliate as part of their official list prior to convention so that this amendment would require only a majority vote.

Andrew Chadderdon (MI) **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair.

Mimi Robson (CA) moved to end debate which PASSED via a voice vote.

The ruling of the Chair was **UPHELD** upon a standing vote.

Scotty Boman (MI) moved to end debate on the Robson motion which **PASSED** via a voice vote.

Multiple Points of Order flew by which were ultimately resolved by an agreement that names can now be added to the Credentials Report so that they can be checked in, and their number be added to the number of voting delegates if credentialled.

Voting then proceeded on the Robson amendment to add to the Michigan delegation which **PASSED** upon a standing vote.

Paul Bracco (VA) moved for division which was joined by a rising second of at least 20 delegates.

The Chair counted off affirmative votes up to 407 and declared that the Robson amendment to add to the Michigan delegation was affirmed to be **PASSED**. The gavel was passed to Vice-Chair Andrew Watkins during the count and resumed by the Chair immediately after the count.

Trevor Best (WA) and Mimi Robson (CA) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that since this is an amendment to the Credentials Committee report it would require a majority vote rather than a 7/8 vote as stated by the Chair.⁸

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **NOT WELL-TAKEN** as names were not eligible to be submitted until convention.

Mimi Robson (CA) APPEALED from the ruling of the Chair.

The ruling of the Chair was **SUSTAINED** upon a standing vote.

John Phillips (IL) moved for division which was joined by a rising second of at least 20 delegates.

Multiple Points of Order flew by caused by a confusion over the significance over the number given in the Credentials Report for a majority which is only relevant when counting a majority of the entire membership and not in votes in which the vote threshold is a majority of those present and voting such as in the current vote. This was resolved by repeating the instruction that a credentials button was all that was needed to vote, not an updated Credentials Report.

A counted vote was taken and upon a vote of 376-413 the ruling of the Chair was **OVERTURNED**.

Rajini Maiatico (CA) moved to end debate which PASSED via a voice vote.

Credentials Committee Chair Josh Hlavka was requested to, and gave, a brief explanation of the findings of the Credentials Committee regarding the omitted names from the Washington delegation.

The Bush motion adding delegates and alternates to Washington **PASSED** upon a standing vote.

Art DiBianca (TX) moved to amend the Credentials Report to include the following alternates to the Oklahoma delegation which were previously forwarded to the Credentials Committee:

An unidentified delegate raised a **POINT OF ORDER** on whether this amendment would require a 7/8 vote, and the Chair indicated that it would.

Pietro Geraci (NY) **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair.

Rex Lawhorne (OK) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that this same issue has already been raised and defeated several times. Though the Chair did not specifically rule, it is presumed to have been **NOT WELL-TAKEN**.

Rajini Maiatico (CA) moved to end debate on the Geraci appeal which **PASSED** via a voice vote.

The Chair attempted to take a vote on the Geraci appeal through several standing votes which were inconclusive, so the Chair ordered a counted vote.

Rex Lawhorne (OK) again raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that this same issue has already been raised and defeated several times which the Chair ruled was **NOT WELL-TAKEN**.

The Chair turned over the gavel to the Vice-Chair during the counted vote and resumed the gavel when counting was finished.

The ruling of the Chair was **OVERTURNED** upon a counted vote of 387 to 436.

Upon request, Credentials Committee Chair Josh Hlavka gave a brief explanation of the findings of the Credentials Committee regarding the omitted names from the Oklahoma delegation.⁹

Jeff Westbrook (TX) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that this same issue has already been raised and defeated several times which makes it dilatory for the Chair to continue to rule in such a manner. No explicit ruling was issued, but it is presumed to have been **NOT WELL-TAKEN**.

Rajini Maiatico (CA) moved to end debate on the DiBianca motion to add to the Oklahoma delegation which **PASSED** upon a standing vote.

Ryan Brown (NC) moved to end debate on all pending questions which **PASSED** via a voice vote.

The Credentials Committee Report, as amended, was ADOPTED upon a standing vote.

LUNCH RECESS

WITHOUT OBJECTION, Josh Hlavka (FL) moved to recess for lunch to return at 1:30 p.m.

The Chair called the Convention back to order at 2:00 p.m.

CONTINUED CREDENTIALLING

T.J. Kosin (PA) moved to suspend the rules and consider the addition of the following alternates:¹⁰

The Kosin motion **PASSED** upon a 7/8 standing vote.

WITHOUT OBJECTION, Cassaundra Fryman (OH) moved to add Dereck Rethman to the Ohio delegation list due to being omitted due to her clerical error.

The motion **PASSED WITHOUT OBJECTION**.

Trisha Butler (MO) moved to remove Arielle Shack from the New Jersey alternate list and add them to the Missouri delegation as a delegate.

The motion **PASSED WITHOUT OBJECTION**.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

After multiple speakers, including Alicia Percell (CA) detailed questions and concerns over potential Bylaws violations that occurred earlier in the day. There were no Points of Order raised.

Ken Moellman (KY) called for ORDERS OF THE DAY.

Bill Redpath (IL) moved to make the Presidential debate part of convention business and to include Mike ter Maat as a 6th participant in that debate. This would happen tomorrow morning as the first order of business at 9:00 a.m. which would then be followed by Orders of the Day. This debate would encompass ninety minutes.

Mimi Robson (CA) moved to amend Mr. Redpath's motion to include amending the Orders of the Day by amending the Standing Order of Business for this convention as follows:

- Treasurer Report (10 minutes)
- Audit Committee Report (10 minutes)
- Election of Party Officers and At-Large Members
- Nominations for POTUS and VPOTUS
- Bylaws and Rules Committee report

- Platform Committee report
- Resolutions
- Other business

The Chair passed the gavel to the Vice-Chair while she consulted with the Parliamentarian. The Vice-Chair instructed the Convention to stand at ease for a few moments.

Andrew Chadderdon (MI) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** regarding business conducted earlier in day which impacted Bylaws 10.4(e) requiring a 7/8 vote to seat delegates and alternates which were not entitled to be registered, and thus the earlier seating of the additional delegates from Oklahoma and Washington were done in violation of that Bylaw which is a violation of a continuing nature and should be ruled null and void.

The Chair asked that the Chadderdon Point of Order be dealt with after the current motions were disposed of. Mr. Chadderdon agreed.

The Chair ruled Mr. Redpath's motion **OUT OF ORDER** due to a distinction between adopting a Special Rule of Order and amending the Agenda. Multiple unidentified delegates **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair. As there appeared to be no support for the Chair's ruling, the Chair declared her ruling **OVERTURNED**.

The Redpath motion **PASSED** via a voice vote.

Ms. Robson's prior motion was treated separately and dealt with as follows:

Mimi Robson (CA) moved to amend the Standing Order of Business for this convention as follows:

- Treasurer Report (10 minutes)
- Audit Committee Report (10 minutes)
- Election of Party Officers and At-Large Members
- Nominations for POTUS and VPOTUS
- Bylaws and Rules Committee report
- Platform Committee report
- Resolutions
- Other business

Art DiBianca (TX) moved to end debate on the Robson motion which **FAILED** via a voice vote.

After further debate, Rajani Maiatico (CA) moved to end debate which **PASSED WITHOUT OBJECTION**.

The Robson motion **PASSED** via a voice vote.

BYLAWS AMENDMENT

Business then returned to the Chadderdon Point of Order as follows:

Andrew Chadderdon (MI) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** regarding business conducted earlier in day which impacted Bylaws 10.4(e) requiring a 7/8 vote to seat delegates and alternates which were not entitled to be registered, and thus the earlier seating of the additional delegates from Oklahoma and Washington were done in violation of that Bylaw which is a violation of a continuing nature and should be ruled null and void.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order WELL-TAKEN.

Art DiBianca (TX) **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair. The Chair stated that she would not be entertaining any appeals from this ruling. Peter Everett (MA) later attempted to appeal from the same ruling, with the Chair repeating that she would not be entertaining any such appeals.

Aaron Starr (CA) moved to suspend the rules and amend Bylaws Article 10.4(e) as follows:

10. CONVENTIONS [...] 4. [...] e. By seven-eighths two-thirds vote, the convention may approve additional delegates and alternates whose names and addresses are submitted to the Credentials Committee during the convention.

Peter Everett (MA) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that a Bylaws amendment was not in order at this time.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **NOT WELL-TAKEN** as Mr. Starr was moving to suspend the rules in order to adopt the amendment.

Dean Ahmed (MD) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that a 7/8 vote threshold cannot be changed by a lower 2/3 threshold. There was no explicit ruling from the Chair but it was implicitly decided to be **NOT WELL-TAKEN** as business moved forward.

John Phillips (IL) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that Mr. Chadderdon's Point of Order was actually a motion to reconsider which would have to be moved by someone on the winning side, and Mr. Chadderdon did not vote on the winning side.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **NOT WELL-TAKEN** for reasons previously explained.

Ken Moellman (KY) **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair. The Chair repeated her earlier determination that she would not be entertaining appeals regarding an ongoing breach of the Party Bylaws.

Doug Craig (GA) moved to amend the Starr motion by striking a two-thirds vote and inserting a majority vote.

Art DiBianca (TX) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that there hasn't been a vote to suspend the rules so that consideration of the actual amendment proposed by Mr. Starr would not be in order.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **NOT WELL-TAKEN** as Mr. Starr's motion was to suspend the rules and adopt the Bylaws amendment in one vote.

The Chair ruled the Craig amendment **OUT OF ORDER** since amendments are not permitted to combined motions to suspend the rules and do a particular action.

Mr. Starr attempted to clarify that his original intent was to suspend the rules, adopt the proposed Bylaws amendment, and to seat the disputed Oklahoma and Washington delegates at the same time.

Art DiBianca (TX) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that Mr. Starr's new language was not in his original proposal and as such would be an amendment which is not in order at this time.

The Chair ruled the Point of Order **WELL-TAKEN**.

Mr. Starr's motion to suspend the rules and adopt the proposed Bylaws amendment *FAILED* upon a standing vote.

Aaron Starr (CA) moved to suspend the rules and amend Bylaws Article 10.4(e) as follows:

10. CONVENTIONS

[...]

4.

[...]

e. By seven-eighths two-thirds vote, the convention may approve additional delegates and alternates whose names and addresses are submitted to the Credentials Committee during the convention.

And to seat the Oklahoma and Washington delegation additions.

General rowdiness ensued with some profanities issued about Donald Trump. Other persons shouted out motions (including a motion to vacate the Chair) were shouted out without being recognized to speak. The Chair refused to entertain additional motions noting that the business at hand was Mr. Starr's present motion.

Mr. Starr's motion to suspend the rules, amend the Bylaws as noted above, and seat the Oklahoma and Washington delegation additions **PASSED** by 2/3 upon a standing vote.

Michael Chianese (WI) moved to suspend the rules to amend the agenda to immediately take up consideration of the ratification of Region One.

The Chair ruled the Chianese motion **OUT OF ORDER** stating that it is not up to persons outside of Region One to vote on who is in Region One.

John Phillips (IL), seeking to clarify Mr. Chianese's motion, moved to suspend the rules to amend the agenda to add a time to debate and consider the LNC's move to ratify Region One against the will of some its members.

Sam Goldstein (IN) moved to suspend the rules and amend the agenda to extend the adjournment time today and tomorrow to 5:00 p.m.

The Chair stated that the Phillips/Chianese motion was in order and clarified that the intention was to take up that item immediately if the rules were suspended.

Multiple Points of Order were made which were properly Points of Parliamentary Inquiry which were answered by the Chair.

The Phillips/Chianese motion to suspend the rules *FAILED* upon a standing vote.

Mary Gingell (CA) raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that persons without delegate badges were voting. The Chair instructed the Delegation Chairs to insure that only delegates with badges are voting.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Art DiBianca (TX) called for **ORDERS OF THE DAY**, and the Chair agreed noting that the next item on the Agenda was the Treasurer's report.

Dan Reale (CT) moved to suspend the rules to give back the time given to RFK, Jr. and Donald Trump to our candidates noting that his motion had 42 signed seconders.

The Chair ruled the Reale motion **OUT OF ORDER** and was interrupted with insults by Mr. Reale before she could explain her ruling by an **APPEAL** and threats to sue the Party and/or the Chair.

More general rowdiness ensued with a misogynistic lewd comment directed to the Chair which resulted in person(s) being escorted out of the hall. The Chair called the disruptive members to order.

The Chair informed the delegates that RFK, Jr. was speaking in another room and that they were free to stay and continue business or to depart to hear the talk.

Art DiBianca (TX) moved to fix the time to which to adjourn at 9:00 a.m. tomorrow.

Mr. DiBianca withdrew his motion once informed that was already part of Mr. Redpath's prior motion which had passed.

John Phillips (IL) moved to take a ten-minute recess which **DIED** for a lack of a second.

Jim Fulner (WI) moved to suspend the rules and extend time to adjournment to 10 p.m. and rescind the invitation to former President Donald Trump.

The Chair ruled the Fulner motion **OUT OF ORDER** as the speaking slot for President Trump is not part of convention business.

Treasurer Todd Hagopian presented his report which is attached as **Appendix E**. Mr. Hagopian fielded questions and answers.

John Thomas (PA) moved to adopt the Treasurer's Report.

The Chair ruled this motion **OUT OF ORDER**. No explicit reason was given.

AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

Adrian F Malagon (CA) moved to proceed to hear the Audit Committee report.

Although there was an objection, the Chair ruled that the ten minutes allotted for the Treasurer have expired, and it was time to move on to the Audit Committee report.

Kathy Yeniscavich, as Chair of the Audit Committee, delivered an oral report.

The Chair turned over the gavel to the Vice-Chair during the report.

Darian Drake (MT) moved to recess for one hour.

The Drake motion *FAILED* upon a standing vote.

CONTINUED CREDENTIALLING

Samuel Bohler (AL) moved to add Joshua Standridge to the Credentials Report due to a clerical error resulting in a failure to submit his name to the Credential Committee.¹¹

The Chair resumed the gavel.

The Bohler motion **PASSED** via a voice vote.

ELECTION OF LNC CHAIR

Sam Goldstein (IN) moved to open nominations for LNC Chair for the 2024-2026 LNC term.

No vote was formally taken and nominations proceeded *WITHOUT OBJECTION*.

- Sam Goldstein (IL) nominated Mark Rutherford

WITHOUT OBJECTION, Paul Bracco (VA) moved to close nominations.

Travis Bost (WV) to suspend the rules to amend the Bylaws to allow stand-in candidates to be nominated for President and Vice-President for this Convention only.

An unidentified delegate raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that this motion would be debatable since it involves amending the Bylaws.

The Chair ruled that the Point of Order was **NOT WELL-TAKEN** as it was a combined motion to suspend the rules and amend the Bylaws in one vote.

ADJOURNMENT OF FIRST DAY OF CONVENTION

Art DiBianca (TX) moved to adjourn for the day.

The DiBianca motion **PASSED** upon a standing vote.

An unidentified delegate moved for division which was joined by a rising second of at least 20 delegates.

After a counted vote of 375-311, the DiBianca motion **PASSED**.

The first day of the convention adjourned for the day at 4:22 p.m. followed by closing announcements to re-convene at 9:00 a.m. the following day.

OPENING CEREMONY DAY TWO

The Convention was called to order by Chair McArdle at 9:07 a.m. The first order of business was a Special Order for a Presidential Debate to take place for ninety minutes.

PRESIDENTIAL DEBATE

Upon a Point of Parliamentary Inquiry by Aaron Starr (CA) regarding whether the prior Smith motion failed under the alternative standard of a majority of all delegates, the Chair stated that since we did not have an updated Credentials Report at that time showing that it would have passed under that standard; the motion was declared as failed; further business had progressed; therefore, questioning of its passage is untimely.

Nick Ciesielski (GA) **APPEALED** from the ruling of the Chair that prior Smith motion failed and that it did pass with a majority of the entire membership. The Chair **DECLINED** to hear the appeal as there was an intervening motion.¹⁵

Mike ter Maat addressed the Convention to announce that he had accepted Chase Oliver's offer to be his Vice-Presidential running mate should the Convention so choose.

The Chair briefly passed the gavel to the Vice-Chair.

An unknown delegate raised a **POINT OF ORDER** that some delegate cast their votes before Dr. ter Maat's announcement, and they should be allowed to re-vote.



There were originally nearly forty proposals which were prioritized to the ones contained in this report with additional items placed on a lower tier (linked at end of the report) which will be presented if there is time remaining. All recommendations considered and passed by this Committee that are not heard during this convention will be passed along to the next Committee. Our Party Bylaws have gotten a bit long in the tooth in some areas, and it is our hope that our proposals will pass and that future committees and conventions will diligently continue this work.

The final version of proposals require a 3/3 vote to pass.

EXPLANATION OF STRUCTURE OF REPORT

This report will give a brief rationale at this time for a proposal; the bylaw or rule as it currently reads; a mark-up copy of the bylaw or rule in the proposal; and a final copy of how the bylaw or rule would read if the proposal passed as proposed. Each proposals stands on its own and reflects the language as it currently reads in the Bylaws and Convention Special Rules of Order.

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PROPOSAL 1 - STANDARDIZE COMMITTEE RULES

Rationale: There are two different standards for similar national convention-related committees which can be terribly confusing, and the differences are not particularly logical. This proposal would consolidate the two sections and have one procedure for the Platform Committee and the Bylaws and Rules Committee, resulting in simplification, consistency, and ease of understanding.

CURRENT WORDING

RULE 4: DEBATING AND VOTING -- BYLAWS AND RULES

The Chair of the Bylaws and Rules Committee shall report each recommendation of the committee to the convention separately and shall have two minutes to explain the intent or purpose of the proposed amendment(s). The Convention Chair shall open each recommendation to discussion without amendment from the floor. Each recommendation shall be considered and adopted separately, with a maximum of eight minutes discussion on any recommendation. After the discussion, the Convention Chair shall bring the recommendation to a vote. If the recommendation fails, the Convention Chair shall open the recommendation to amendment for an additional 10 minutes.

RULE 5: DEBATING AND VOTING -- PLATFORM

- After the adoption of the convention agenda, the convention will vote whether to delete planks from the existing platform. This will be accomplished as follows:
 - a. The Credentials Committee shall issue five signature tokens to each delegate.
 - Tokens shall only be issued to delegates. Delegates are responsible for transferring possession of unused tokens to their alternates if necessary.
 - c. Each delegate may cast each token as a recommendation for deletion of one plank by noting on the token the plank to be deleted and signing the token.
 - d. A delegate may cumulate recommendations by casting any number of tokens for deletion of the same plank.
 - e. Delegates will be given until one hour prior to the scheduled start of the platform report to mark their tokens and deliver them to the Secretary.
 - f. Prior to the scheduled start of the platform report, the Secretary shall review the tokens received and tabulate and report the tokens submitted for deletion of each plank.
 - g. As its first item of platform business, the convention shall vote whether to delete each of those planks that received a number of tokens for deletion equal to 20% or more of the number of credentialed delegates. Such votes shall be cast without amendment or debate.
- The Platform Committee shall meet before each regular convention and prepare a report containing its recommendations. At the convention, the Platform Committee's recommendations shall be reported to the floor and debated and

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- voted upon separately. The Platform Committee shall set forth the order in which each recommendation shall be considered.
- 3. Recommendations for which there is no minority report shall be debated and voted upon in the following manner:
 - a. The Platform Committee Chair, or some other person designated by him or her, shall read the proposed recommendation and shall have up to two minutes to explain the recommendation.
 - b. The Convention Chair shall then open the recommendation to debate without amendment for a period of up to 15 minutes before bringing the matter to a vote. If the recommendation fails, the Convention Chair shall inquire if any amendments are proposed from the floor. If there are such proposals, the Convention Chair shall request a vote on whether to consider amendments, and with majority approval may consider amendments for a period of up to 10 minutes.
- 4. Recommendations for which there is a minority report shall be debated and voted upon in the following manner:
 - a. Spokespersons for both the majority and minority positions shall each have two minutes to present their views.
 - b. The Chair shall then open consideration of both positions for five minutes during which time any delegates may express their views without offering amendments. After five minutes, there will be a vote on which of the two reports shall be considered for purposes of adopting a recommendation. The report receiving the greater number of votes shall then be discussed and voted upon in the manner described in Section 3b.
- 5. After all committee recommendations have received initial consideration, any delegate may propose amendments to the platform. The delegate may take up to two minutes to state and explain the proposal, with debating and voting to proceed as described in Section 3b.
- 6. Finally, if time permits, proposals which were considered by the Platform Committee but which received an unfavorable vote from a majority of the committee, may be considered, with a spokesperson for the minority position giving the reasons in favor and the Platform Committee Chair or other representative of the majority position giving the reasons why it was voted down, before the proposal is taken to the floor for debate.
- 7. Challenges of adopted Party planks believed by 10% of the delegates to be in conflict with the Statement of Principles shall be referred in writing, during the convention, to the Judicial Committee by the delegates requesting action for consideration. The challenge shall specify in what manner the plank is believed to be in conflict. The Judicial Committee shall consider the challenge, decide whether the Statement of Principles is conformed to and report their findings and reasons to the convention. If the plank is vetoed by the Judicial Committee, it will be declared null and void but can be reinstated by a 3/4 vote of the convention.
- 8. Should changes to the bylaws or platform result in a grammatical error in accordance with the latest edition of the Chicago Manual of Style, the National Committee presiding at the time of that discovery is authorized to make those

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grammatical corrections provided it does not change the meaning or intent of the item edited.

MARK-UP COPY OF PROPOSAL

RULE 4: DEBATING AND VOTING -- BYLAWS AND RULES

The Chair of the Bylaws and Rules Committee shall report each recommendation of the committee to the convention separately and shall have two minutes to explain the intent or purpose of the proposed amendment(s).  - e. Delegates will be given until one hour prior to the scheduled start of the platform report to mark their tokens and deliver them to the Secretary.

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- a. The *Platform* Committee Chair, or some other person designated by him or her their designee, shall read the proposed recommendation and shall have up to two minutes to explain the recommendation.
- b. The Convention Chair shall then open the recommendation to debate without amendment for a period of up to 45 10 minutes before bringing the matter to a vote. If the recommendation fails, the Convention Chair shall inquire if any amendments are proposed from the floor. If there are such proposals, the Convention Chair shall request a vote on whether to consider amendments, and with majority approval may consider amendments for a period of up to 10 minutes.
- 4. Recommendations for which there is a minority report shall be debated and voted upon in the following manner:
 - a. Spokespersons for both the majority and minority positions shall each have two
 minutes each to present their views.
 - b. The Chair shall then open consideration of both positions for five minutes during which time any delegates may express their views without offering amendments. After five minutes, there will be a vote on which of the two reports shall be considered for purposes of adopting a recommendation. The report receiving the greater number of votes shall then be discussed and voted upon in the manner described in Section 3b.
- After all committee recommendations have received initial consideration, any delegate may propose amendments to the <u>bylaws and rules or the</u> platform. The delegate may take up to two minutes to state and explain the proposal, with debating and voting to proceed as described in Section 3b.

The Committees shall set forth the order in which each recommendation shall be considered.
- 3. Recommendations for which there is no minority report shall be debated and voted upon in the following manner:
 - a. The Committee Chair, or their designee, shall read the proposed recommendation and shall have up to two minutes to explain the recommendation.
 - b. The Convention Chair shall then open the recommendation to debate without amendment for a period of up to 10 minutes before bringing the matter to a vote. If the recommendation fails, the Convention Chair shall inquire if any amendments are proposed from the floor. If there are such proposals, the Convention Chair shall request a vote on whether to consider amendments, and with majority approval may consider amendments for a period of up to 10 minutes.
- 4. Recommendations for which there is a minority report shall be debated and voted upon in the following manner:
 - a. Spokespersons for both the majority and minority positions shall have two minutes each to present their views.
 - b. The Chair shall then open consideration of both positions for five minutes during which time any delegates may express their views without offering

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- amendments. After five minutes, there will be a vote on which of the two reports shall be considered for purposes of adopting a recommendation. The report receiving the greater number of votes shall then be discussed and voted upon in the manner described in Section 3b.
- 5. After all committee recommendations have received initial consideration, any delegate may propose amendments to the bylaws and rules or the platform. The delegate may take up to two minutes to state and explain the proposal, with debating and voting to proceed as described in Section 3b.
- 6. Challenges of adopted Party planks believed by 10% of the delegates to be in conflict with the Statement of Principles shall be referred in writing, during the convention, to the Judicial Committee by the delegates requesting action for consideration. The challenge shall specify in what manner the plank is believed to be in conflict. The Judicial Committee shall consider the challenge, decide whether the Statement of Principles is conformed to and report their findings and reasons to the convention. If the plank is vetoed by the Judicial Committee, it will be declared null and void but can be reinstated by a 3/4 vote of the convention.
- 7. Should changes to the bylaws or platform result in a grammatical error in accordance with the latest edition of the Chicago Manual of Style, the National Committee presiding at the time of that discovery is authorized to make those grammatical corrections provided it does not change the meaning or intent of the item edited.

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PROPOSAL 2 - RISING SECONDS

Rationale: In large bodies, like conventions, it takes only two delegates (a mover and a seconder) to propose items that have no realistic chance of passing. This could be dilatory, but is more often inadvertent, as it may be hard to read the room. This proposal would require a higher threshold of agreement that a motion should be heard (a standing second of enough people to indicate a sufficient level of support), which will result in less wasted time and frustration.

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PROPOSAL 3 - CHANGE TIMING OF COMMITTEE APPTS

Rationale: Committees cannot elect a chair and get to work until the committee composition is known. This means the committee must wait until the last eligible affiliate makes its appointment, which is invariably around the deadline itself. For both the Credentials Committee and the Platform Committee, this means that in practice they only have three months and six months, respectively, to carry out their duties. In past terms members of both committees have expressed frustration with the working timeline of their committee being too short.

This proposal seeks to double these committees' working timelines by moving the appointment dates to six months for the Credentials Committee and twelve months for the Platform Committee. Additionally, the twelve-month appointment requirement for the Platform Committee would align their working timeline to that of the Bylaws and Rules Committee.

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PROPOSAL 4 – REMOVAL FROM OFFICE

Rationale: Whether the due process provisions of our parliamentary authority apply to removal of officers and by extension, at-large members, is ambiguous. It is incumbent upon us to resolve that ambiguity. This proposal extends more due process to the accused. This procedure would not allow the LNC to remove a minority member just because they find them "difficult," which can be inherent in a vocal minority member that the delegates chose. This is a balance between honoring the will of the delegates and protecting the Party.

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PROPOSAL 5 – RE-STRUCTURE LNC

Rationale: This proposal would add more at-large members to replace all regional representatives and shrink the overall size of the LNC. The voting system would be changed to cumulative voting, which better facilitates minority representation. The existing regional system puts undue power in the hands of either state chairs or state executive committees when forming regions; the delegates have no direct say in what region their affiliate joins. It also creates a potential conflict of interest, as regional representatives are serving two masters: their regions and the Party. If a regional representative breaches a fiduciary duty, only the region itself can remove them; the LNC has no true disciplinary power.

Delegates do not necessarily have geography as their primary focus. Someone may care more about ballot access or ideology or fundraising or any of a number of things than where a candidate for regional representative or alternate happens to reside. Talent may not be equally distributed geographically. Some states and regions have many active, competent, enthusiastic activists with the financial means to travel around the country to meetings while other affiliates have few.

Many with experience serving on the LNC or other boards believe our national committee is too large to be effective. If you have 18 people who want to be heard on every issue, then discussion and voting take a lot longer than if there were fewer — and the decisions made by larger boards are not better. Shrinking the LNC does not necessarily mean shrinking participation in national matters. The LNC can and should have many committees with non-LNC members to which it delegates responsibility or from which it gets specialized advice.

With cumulative voting—which is an integral part of this proposal—the board will be more representative of the body as a whole. Cumulative voting allows a minority voting bloc to strategically band together and ensure they get representation on the board, unlike approval voting (our current system) where a majority bloc can run the table and get all the seats.

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PROPOSAL 6 – LIMIT COMMITTEE ALTERNATES

Rationale: Under our current Bylaws, affiliates or the LNC can appoint an unlimited number of alternates to committees. Because committee alternates have customarily debated and commented freely, the inclusion of excessive alternates on committees may negatively impact a committee's effectiveness. Appointing bodies can always fill vacancies for primary and alternate committee members.

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PROPOSAL 7 - RAISE MEMBERSHIP DUES

Rationale: Party sustaining membership dues have not permanently increased since December 11, 1993 (more than 30 years ago). (Note: In 2005 dues were increased to \$50, then brought down to zero, then brought back to \$25 at the 2006 national convention.) There has been significant inflation since 1993, meaning that the LNC now receives less resources in real terms from membership dues. Costs of servicing each member have gone up significantly, such as costs of printing and postage. This proposal would better align membership dues in real terms to the last time they were updated.

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PROPOSAL 8 – ADD NOTICE REQUIREMENTS

Rationale: Best practice for stability and avoiding ambush in changes to bylaws is to require notice, and it is highly unusual for an organization of our size and place in the political landscape to have no notice requirements. However, we also need to balance the protection of notice requirements with the desire to avoid "proposal committees" effectively turning into gatekeepers. This proposal balances these interests by allowing notice for member-submitted proposals and still allowing proposals from the floor with a higher passage threshold.



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PROPOSAL 9 - AMEND VOTING PROCEDURES

Rationale: The way they are now worded, the convention rules arguably authorize dropping a defeated candidate in the first round only. This proposal would eliminate the current ambiguity by explicitly authorizing a candidate to be dropped in each round. Further, write-ins are prohibited to both reduce wasted teller time and make the nomination process already required in the convention rules more meaningful. Nomination signature requirements are already quite low, so candidates who do not make the ballot do not have a realistic chance to be elected. Lastly, this is a step towards preparing us for pure electronic voting.

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PROPOSAL 10 – ADD RCV VOTING FOR OFFICERS

Rationale: The Party's existing method to elect Party officers of the National Committee is outdated and inefficient. The Libertarian Party platform "support[s] ... election systems that are more representative of the electorate...." Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) is a balloting method that eliminates multiple rounds of voting, facilitates greater voter expression than a single choice ballot, and mitigates the "wasted vote" problem. Using RCV also helps our Party practice what we preach by implementing more competitive and representative electoral methods, familiarizes Party members with the use of such methods, and models the use of such methods to external audiences.

Adding RCV for officers only would allow the Party to get used to this method with an eye to add it to other offices, including also the potential for STV (proportional representation) for multi-winner races. Additionally, RCV would free up convention time which could be used for other business because

Further, after future convention delegates approve of and implement an electronic balloting method, convention time spent on elections should be significantly reduced.

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PROPOSAL 12 – AFFILIATE ENDORSEMENTS

Rationale: There is ongoing debate about whether affiliates should be permitted to nominate fusion candidates (candidates running with both a Libertarian Party ballot line and a Republican or Democrat or Green, etc. ballot line). Our current bylaws restrict endorsement based on membership in other parties. However, this restriction is confusing because many other political parties do not have membership in the way Libertarians do. Voter registration is often a better indicator of partisan identity, but many states do not have partisan registration. This proposal would explicitly allow fusion candidates if their primary identity (party registration, when available) is Libertarian.

Rationale: The current delegate allocation is based in part on each state's share of presidential vote totals, meaning that an affiliate party could be allocated less delegates if they were to fail to qualify for the ballot due to onerous ballot access laws in their state. This proposal will separate delegate allocation from presidential vote totals, while maintaining a similar total number of delegates. It will also encourage affiliate parties wishing to increase their delegate allocation to seek out more members for the national LP, which will help with the LNC's bottom line.

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PROPOSAL 14 - CLARIFY QUORUM ISSUES

Rationale: There has been a long-standing debate about whether our bylaws allow "check-out." The ambiguity should be cleared up. With a check-out procedure, the Credentials Committee would need to staff a desk with significant volunteer time. This proposal eliminates the ambiguity by explicitly stating that checkouts do not affect quorum requirements.

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PROPOSAL 15 – JUDICIAL COMMITTEE AND APPEAL OF LNC

Rationale: In addition to allowing appeal of an action when the LNC does something the bylaws may prohibit (current rules), this proposal provides for appeal of an inaction when the LNC fails to do something the bylaws may require. It also jettisons the "ten percent of delegates credentialed at the most recent regular convention" and retains the "one percent of the Party's sustaining members" appeal petition threshold. The former has not been used and was hard to count, whereas the latter has been frequently used and is easy to count -- especially after clarifying when to measure sustaining membership. Finally, this proposal authorizes the Judicial Committee to order the LNC to remediate a violation.

Proposal #1: Update Preamble

Preamble (AMEND)

Problem: The Preamble still references "pages," which is out-of-date for the modern electronic world.

Solution: Amend the Preamble to update the wording to reference the document, not its pages.

Benefits: Updates the wording by removing old terminology.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

PREAMBLE

As Libertarians, we seek a world of liberty: a world in which all individuals are sovereign over their own lives and are not forced to sacrifice their values for the benefit of others. We believe that respect for individual rights is the essential precondition for a free and prosperous world, that force and fraud must be banished from human relationships, and that only through freedom can peace and prosperity be realized. Consequently, we defend each person's right to engage in any activity that is peaceful and honest, and welcome the diversity that freedom brings. The world we seek to build is one where individuals are free to follow their own dreams in their own ways, without interference from government or any authoritarian power. In the following pages In this Platform, we set forth our basic principles and enumerate various policy stands derived from those principles. These specific policies are not our goal, however. Our goal is nothing more nor less than a world set free in our lifetime, and it is to this end that we take these stands.

Proposal #2: Repudiate Government Debt

2.5 Government Debt (AMEND)

Problem: The platform's current prescription for dealing with government debt (saying it "burdens future generations without their consent" and calling for a Balanced Budget Amendment) is indistinguishable from a mainstream "fiscal conservative" pipe dream which went out the window decades ago, as well as focusing on the federal level, and implying that people currently living consented to the debt. As the problem of government debt continues to grow out of control, Libertarians should have a solution that is neither moderate nor laughably unachievable (nor exclusive to the federal level), as well as make clear that the people don't consent to government debt like they do private debt.

Solution: Replace the current "fiscal conservative" denouncement of burdening future generations and calling for a Balanced Budget Amendment with a Rothbardian denouncement of all government debt as illegitimate, all people as non-consenting, and call to default on it at all levels.

Benefits: This will radically differentiate Libertarians from "conservative Republicans" as it will make clear that it's not just future generations who are being burdened without their consent, and it will provide a solution to uncontrolled government spending which is radical yet can be adopted at any level at any time.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

2.5 Government Debt

Government should not incur debt, which burdens future generations without their consent. We support the passage of a "Balanced Budget Amendment" to the U.S. Constitution, provided that the budget is balanced exclusively by cutting expenditures, and not by raising taxes.

Government debt is wholly illegitimate, as it burdens the people without their consent. We support repudiating all government debts at all levels as a means of both relieving unjust financial burdens and limiting the growth of government.

Proposal #3: Presumption of Health

2.13 Health Care (AMEND)

Problem: The plank is out of date post-COVID. People were assumed to be sick instead of healthy and treated terribly because of that bad assumption. The Party was inexcusably silent on this issue and should not be if it is truly respectful of the individual. This is especially relevant considering recent events in New York, where the Governor is attempting to implement Rule 2.13 to forcibly quarantine people in "sick camps" solely on the whim of the government.

Solution: Add language to presume health instead of sickness.

Benefits: Declares support for people by presuming health over sickness in the same way innocence is presumed over guilt.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

2.13 Health Care

We favor a free market health care system. Medical facilities, medical providers, and medical products (including drugs) must be freely available in the marketplace without government restrictions or licenses. We recognize the freedom of individuals to determine the level of health insurance they want (if any), the level of health care they want, the care providers they want, the medicines and treatments they will use and all other aspects of their medical care, including end-of-life decisions. People should be free to purchase health insurance across state lines. We oppose governments either mandating, or restricting voluntary access to, medical treatments or procedures including vaccines. Individuals have a presumption of health and should not be subjected to forced quarantine, isolation, or other restrictions of their rights and freedoms.

Proposal #4: Agorism

(Note: This is similar to Proposal 15 from the 2022 Platform Committee.)

2.X Agorism (ADD)

Problem: The Platform lacks a plank on Agorism. Agorism is a political philosophy that advocates creating a society in which all relations between people are voluntary exchanges while diminishing the state's economic control.

Solution: Add one.

Benefits: Strengthens the Platform in a bold and radical way to separate exercise of individual rights from permission to do so under the law (which makes it the exercise of a privilege, not the exercise of a right!), with the proper limitation of such exercise being that it does not violate the rights of others.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

2.X Agorism

We affirm the right of individuals and businesses to peacefully subvert government regulation, taxation, and restrictions through black and gray market activity.

Proposal #5: Taxes are Still Theft, by Any Name

2.4 Government Finance and Spending (AMEND)

Problem: The plank neglects to address new taxes and taxes that have other names applied to them. This is especially important given recent discussions by the statists to add wealth taxes and taxes on unrealized capital gains. It also does not address use of taxes as behavior and economic influencers.

Solution: Add language to address new taxes and taxes that have other names, and to address behavior taxes.

Benefits: Fills gaps in the plank and strengthens it. Calls out that taxes of any name or vintage are still theft, er, taxes. Opposes vice and sin taxes. Opposes new taxes.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

2.4 Government Finance and Spending

Since all persons are entitled to keep the fruits of their labor, we oppose all government activity that consists of the forcible collection of money or goods from individuals in violation of their individual rights. We contend that a tax by any other name is still a tax and strive for the eventual repeal of all taxation. To further that end, we call for the repeal of the income tax, the abolishment of the Internal Revenue Service and all federal programs and services not required under the U.S. Constitution. We oppose the use of taxation as a punitive measure against certain goods or services, such as "vice" taxes, and oppose forcing employers to serve as tax collectors. We support any initiative to reduce or abolish any tax, and oppose any increase on any tax or creation of any new tax for any reason. To the extent possible, we advocate that all public services be funded or allowed to be provided in a voluntary manner.

Proposal #6: Stand Your Ground and Shoot Back

1.9 Self-Defense (AMEND)

Problem: The self-defense plank does not mention support of castle doctrines or similar affirmative defenses against aggression and prosecution for defending oneself and others and property. Not every state has these self-defense laws. They should.

Solution: Add language for those specific instances.

Benefits: Closes a gap in the plank and shows stronger support for the right to self-defense against aggression in all places.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

1.9 Self-Defense

The only legitimate use of force is in defense of individual rights — life, liberty, and justly acquired property — against aggression. This right inheres in the individual, who may agree to be aided by any other individual or group. We support stand-your-ground and castle doctrines. We affirm the individual right recognized by the Second Amendment to keep and bear arms, and oppose the prosecution of individuals for exercising their rights of self-defense. Private property owners should be free to establish their own conditions regarding the presence of personal defense weapons on their own property. We oppose all laws at any level of government restricting, registering, or monitoring the ownership, manufacture, or transfer of firearms, ammunition, or firearm accessories.

Proposal #7: Space, the Final Frontier...of Freedom

(This was Proposal 14 from the 2022 Platform Committee.)

1.X Space Exploration (ADD)

Problem: The Platform doesn't address state control of space exploration and use. Private space service has supplanted government-sponsored space service in several key areas. What was once a matter of science fiction has become reality. New innovations from private companies include better, reusable, rocket designs and efficient cost-savings measures. These advances by the private sector have injected new interest into space exploration and made possible missions which were not possible a decade earlier. Increasingly, it appears that many space services and exploration will in the future be driven by private industry rather than by NASA. NASA may always have a role in space investigations, but in the near future private industry and/or organizations may set the pace for exploratory as well as routine space missions.

Solution: Add a plank to address it.

Benefits: This new plank would allow the Party to communicate to the public that Libertarians welcome a new space age for private organizations and individuals, one which is unencumbered by burdensome government regulations.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

1.X Space Exploration

We oppose all government restrictions upon voluntary, peaceful use of outer space.

Proposal #8: Intellectual Property

2.X Intellectual Property (ADD)

Problem: No matter what position any person takes on intellectual property, it is nearly universally acknowledged that the government's handling of this has been stifling and hamhanded. There are better free market solutions that can be allowed to flourish if the government would stay out. The market has already pioneered the way with the creation of items such as creative commons licensing.

Solution: Create a new platform plank that makes clear that Libertarians do not view ideas as property, and do not believe disputes between parties should be resolved by government. In addition, also makes clear that Libertarians view fraudulent misrepresentation as immoral aggression against others.

Benefits: This would solidify the Libertarian Party position on IP. It would also differentiate the Party both from Republicans—who have a platform with rigid intellectual property protections and considers it a "national security issue," and Democrats—who have a platform that also embraces government safeguards on intellectual property and opposes the theft of intellectual property only by foreign governments.

Add new plank:

2.X Intellectual Property

As we believe that ideas are not property, we favor the repeal of intellectual property laws but oppose fraudulent misrepresentation about goods and services. Disputes between inventors, creators, authors, artists, businesses and other such entities should be resolved according to principles of any contractual obligations between the parties involved.

Proposal #9: War, Invasion, and Occupation

3.3 International Affairs (AMEND)

Problem: The plank mentions peace but forgets about ending war, invasion, and occupation of other nations.

Solution: Add those into the plank.

Benefits: Fills a major gap in the plank and strengthens it.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

3.3 International Affairs

American foreign policy should emphasize peace with all nations, entangling alliances with none. We would end the current U.S. government policies of foreign intervention including military and economic aid; tariffs; economic sanctions; aggressive war, invasion, and occupation; and regime change. We recognize the right of all people to resist tyranny and defend themselves and their rights. We condemn the use of force, and especially the use of terrorism, against the innocent, regardless of whether such acts are committed by governments or by political or revolutionary groups.

Proposal #10: No Standing Army

3.1 National Defense (AMEND)

Problem: The current platform arguably endorses a standing government military, which has long been used to carry out aggressive wars of imperialism that undermine American (and global) security and increase tyranny at home. Libertarians ought to expressly support the demonopolization/de-socialization of defense services.

Solution: Amend the national defense plank to oppose a standing government military rather than vaguely endorse one; endorse a transitory policy of armed neutrality and opposition to military deployment outside United States territory.

Benefits: This would hold up the radical ideal of non-governmental defense forces while also endorsing transitory policies which would minimize if not end American imperialism in the meantime.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

3.1 National Defense

We support the maintenance of a sufficient military to defend the United States against aggression. We oppose the existence of a standing government military as a threat to peace and security. In the meantime, we support a policy of armed neutrality and oppose the stationing of military assets inside foreign territory. The United States should both avoid entangling alliances and abandon its attempts to act as policeman for the world. We oppose any form of compulsory national service.

Proposal #11: Separation of Family and State

(Note: This contains language that was part of Proposal 18 from the 2022 Platform Committee.)

1.5 Parental Rights (AMEND)

Problem: The parental rights plank refers to "other guardians" without referring to them as not being state guardians ad litem. The Platform itself is silent on the role that families should have in lieu of the state in raising children and supporting each other outside of the state.

Solution: Add language that puts emphasis back on the family unit and away from the state.

Benefits: Stronger pro-family language with an emphasis on people and away from the state.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

1.5 Parental Rights

We support the separation of family and state. Parents, or other guardians, have the right to raise their children according to their own standards and beliefs, provided that the rights of children to be free from abuse and neglect are also protected. We reject state ownership or guardianship of children and we support families choosing to support each other regardless of their composition. Permanent separation of family members must be adjudicated by true due process, not in administrative hearings.

Proposal #12: Veterans

3.1 National Defense (AMEND)

Problem: There is a tendency to conflate government policy and its implementers, especially when it comes to the military, and that dates back to Vietnam. The Platform does not acknowledge that there is a difference between objecting to government policy that puts these people in harm's way for no good reason and the people themselves; the government through its bad policy choices is the problem. Veterans are people who implement military policy, not the policy itself, and that difference needs to be clearly acknowledged.

Solution: Amend the plank to address veterans separate from policy.

Benefits: Differentiates between person and policy in government. Offers appeal to the veteran constituency that has been effectively abandoned by the duopoly.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

3.1 National Defense

We support the maintenance of a sufficient military to defend the United States against aggression. The United States should both avoid entangling alliances and abandon its attempts to act as policeman for the world. We oppose any form of compulsory national service. We believe in honoring our veterans by crafting and implementing policies to end aggression, undeclared wars, invasions, and occupations, while recognizing the difference between veterans and the policies they are sent out to implement.

Proposal #13: Separation of State and State

3.X Separation of Federal, State, and Local Governments (ADD)

Problem: An important yet neglected concept of shrinking and abolishing government is the necessity to also separate the various layers of government from each other. Currently the federal government funds and mandates state and local governments, and state governments fund and mandate local governments, and all of them infringe upon the people. To roll back this mess, it also needs to be separated out into its component parts so that they can be addressed individually. The platform does not address this essential concept.

Solution: Add a plank to address it.

Benefits: Fills in a huge gap in the platform and illustrates that the Party understands the real scope of the problem of mixed and tangled levels of governance, beyond pure rhetoric, and what is needed to be done with it to achieve its goals.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

3.X Separation of Federal, State, and Local Governments

We support the untangling of the layers of government from each other, including removal of mandates, subsidies, and commandeering, such that federal, state, county, municipal, and district governments are separate and independent from each other, in both function and funding, in order to facilitate their reduction or repeal. We support the nullification of unjust laws.

Platform Committee Report—2024 Libertarian National Convention

Proposal #14: Gender Identities and Self-Expression

(Note: This was Proposal 19 from the 2022 Platform Committee.)

1.4 Personal Relationships (AMEND)

Problem: The current wording of this plank remains somewhat ambiguous on rights to transgender expression. It proclaims that the government should not be able to interfere with such rights but makes no statement about whether educational institutions or employers or merchants might be able to decide what a person's gender is, in contradiction of the person's own view.

Solution: Add language to address it.

Benefits: Removes the state from the equation and strengthens free expression while offering support to the transgender community.

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

1.4 Personal Relationships

Sexual orientation, preference, gender, or gender identity should have no impact on the government's treatment of individuals, such as in current marriage, child custody, adoption, immigration, or military service laws. Individuals have the sole authority to determine and express their own gender identities. Government does not have the authority to define, promote, license, or restrict self-expression or personal relationships, regardless of the number of participants. Consenting adults should be free to choose their own sexual practices and personal relationships. Until such time as the government stops its illegitimate practice of marriage licensing, such licenses must be granted to all consenting adults who apply.

Platform Committee Report—2024 Libertarian National Convention

Proposal #15: Delete Sex Work Plank

2.10 Sex Work (DELETE)

Problem: The Platform already addresses victimless crimes—including sexual services—in Plank 1.7. Giving sex work its own plank unnecessarily inflates its importance in the Platform.

Solution: Delete it.

Benefits: Removes the false impression that plays into the worst stereotypes of Libertarians as being primarily concerned with libertinism.

(NOTE: If this plank is moved to be deleted by tokens, then this proposal will not be presented.)

Amend something previously adopted as follows:

2 10 Say Work

The Libertarian Party supports the decriminalization of prostitution. We assert the right of consenting adults to provide sexual services to clients for compensation, and the right of clients to purchase sexual services from consenting sex workers.

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APPENDIX A - Marked-Up Copy of Platform with Proposals

PREAMBLE

As Libertarians, we seek a world of liberty: a world in which all individuals are sovereign over their own lives and are not forced to sacrifice their values for the benefit of others. We believe that respect for individual rights is the essential precondition for a free and prosperous world, that force and fraud must be banished from human relationships, and that only through freedom can peace and prosperity be realized. Consequently, we defend each person's right to engage in any activity that is peaceful and honest, and welcome the diversity that freedom brings. The world we seek to build is one where individuals are free to follow their own dreams in their own ways, without interference from government or any authoritarian power. In the following pages In this Platform, we set forth our basic principles and enumerate various policy stands derived from those principles. These specific policies are not our goal, however. Our goal is nothing more nor less than a world set free in our lifetime, and it is to this end that we take these stands.

STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

We, the members of the Libertarian Party, challenge the cult of the omnipotent state and defend the rights of the individual. We hold that all individuals have the right to exercise sole dominion over their own lives, and have the right to live in whatever manner they choose, so long as they do not forcibly interfere with the equal right of others to live in whatever manner they choose. Governments throughout history have regularly operated on the opposite principle, that the State has the right to dispose of the lives of individuals and the fruits of their labor. Even within the United States, all political parties other than our own grant to government the right to regulate the lives of individuals and seize the fruits of their labor without their consent. We, on the contrary, deny the right of any government to do these things, and hold that where governments exist, they must not violate the rights of any individual: namely, (1) the right to life — accordingly we support the prohibition of the initiation of physical force against others; (2) the right to liberty of speech and action — accordingly we oppose all attempts by government to abridge the freedom of speech and press, as well as government censorship in any form; and (3) the right to property — accordingly we oppose all government interference with private property, such as confiscation, nationalization, and eminent domain, and support the prohibition of robbery, trespass, fraud, and misrepresentation. Since governments, when instituted, must not violate individual rights, we oppose all interference by government in the areas of voluntary and contractual relations among individuals. People should not be forced to sacrifice their lives and property for the benefit of others. They should be left free by government to deal with one another as free traders; and the resultant economic system, the only one compatible with the protection of individual rights, is the free market.

1.0 PERSONAL LIBERTY

Individuals are inherently free to make choices for themselves and must accept responsibility for the consequences of the choices they make. Our support of an individual's right to make choices in life does not mean that we necessarily approve or disapprove of those choices. No individual, group, or government may rightly initiate force against any other individual, group, or government. Libertarians reject the notion that groups have inherent rights. We support the rights of the smallest minority, the individual.

1.1 Self-Ownership

Individuals own their bodies and have rights over them that other individuals, groups, and governments may not violate. Individuals have the freedom and responsibility to decide what they knowingly and voluntarily consume, and what risks they accept to their own health, finances, safety, or life.

1.2 Expression and Communication

We support full freedom of expression and oppose government censorship, regulation, or control of communications media and technology. Language that is perceived to be offensive to certain groups or individuals is not a cause for any legal action. Speech that is not literally a threat of aggression or violence is not in itself aggression or violence and can never be used to justify aggression or violence. Individuals are responsible for their own reactions to speech. We favor the freedom to engage in or abstain from any religious activities that do not violate the rights of others. We oppose government actions that either aid or attack any religion.

1.3 Privacy

Libertarians advocate individual privacy and government transparency. We are committed to ending government's practice of spying on everyone. We support the rights recognized by the Fourth Amendment to be secure in our persons, homes, property, and communications. Protection from unreasonable search and seizure should include records held by third parties, such as email, medical, and library records.

1.4 Personal Relationships

Sexual orientation, preference, gender, or gender identity should have no impact on the government's treatment of individuals, such as in current marriage, child custody, adoption, immigration, or military service laws. Individuals have the sole authority to determine and express their own gender identities. Government does not have the authority to define, promote, license, or restrict self-expression or personal relationships, regardless of the number of participants. Consenting adults should be free to choose their own sexual practices and personal relationships. Until such time as the government stops its illegitimate practice of marriage licensing, such licenses must be granted to all consenting adults who apply.

1.5 Parental Rights

We support the separation of family and state. Parents, or other guardians, have the right to raise their children according to their own standards and beliefs, provided that the rights of

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children to be free from abuse and neglect are also protected. We reject state ownership or guardianship of children and we support families choosing to support each other regardless of their composition. Permanent separation of family members must be adjudicated by true due process, not in administrative hearings.

1.6 Adult Rights and Responsibilities

Once individuals are presumed to have adequate judgment to vote and serve on a jury or in the military, they should also be presumed to have sufficient judgment to decide their own purchase and use of alcohol, tobacco, firearms, cannabis, and engage in other activities currently restricted by government due to age.

1.7 Crime and Justice

Government force must be limited to the protection of the rights of individuals to life, liberty, and property, and governments must never be permitted to violate these rights. Laws should be limited in their application to violations of the rights of others through force or fraud, or to deliberate actions that place others involuntarily at significant risk of harm. Therefore, we favor the repeal of all laws creating "crimes" without victims, such as gambling, the use of drugs for medicinal or recreational purposes, and consensual transactions involving sexual services. We support restitution to the victim to the fullest degree possible at the expense of the criminal or the negligent wrongdoer. The constitutional rights of the criminally accused, including due process, a speedy trial, legal counsel, trial by jury, and the legal presumption of innocence until proven guilty, must be preserved. We assert the common-law right of juries to judge not only the facts but also the justice of the law. We oppose the prosecutorial practice of "overcharging" in criminal prosecutions so as to avoid jury trials by intimidating defendants into accepting plea bargains. Additionally, we support the abolition of qualified immunity so that law enforcement and prosecutors would be held legally accountable for misconduct that leads to wrongful convictions or other acts of injustice.

1.8 Death Penalty

We oppose the administration of the death penalty by the state.

1.9 Self-Defense

The only legitimate use of force is in defense of individual rights — life, liberty, and justly acquired property — against aggression. This right inheres in the individual, who may agree to be aided by any other individual or group. We support stand-your-ground and castle doctrines. We affirm the individual right recognized by the Second Amendment to keep and bear arms, and oppose the prosecution of individuals for exercising their rights of self-defense. Private property owners should be free to establish their own conditions regarding the presence of personal defense weapons on their own property. We oppose all laws at any level of government restricting, registering, or monitoring the ownership, manufacture, or transfer of firearms, ammunition, or firearm accessories.

1.X Space Exploration

We oppose all government restrictions upon voluntary, peaceful use of outer space.

2.0 ECONOMIC LIBERTY

Libertarians want all members of society to have abundant opportunities to achieve economic success. A free and competitive market allocates resources in the most efficient manner. Each person has the right to offer goods and services to others on the free market. The only proper role of government in the economic realm is to protect property rights, adjudicate disputes, and provide a legal framework in which voluntary trade is protected. All efforts by government to redistribute wealth, or to control or manage trade, are improper in a free society.

2.1 Aggression, Property, and Contract

Aggression is the use, trespass against, or invasion of the borders of another person's owned resource (property) without the owner's consent; or the threat thereof. We oppose all acts of aggression as illegitimate and unjust, whether committed by private actors or the state. Each person is the presumptive owner of his or her own body (self-ownership), which right may be forfeited only as a consequence of committing an act of aggression. Property rights in external, scarce resources are determined in accordance with the principles of original appropriation or homesteading (whereby a person becomes an owner of an unowned resource by first use and transformation), contract (whereby the owner consensually transfers ownership to another person), and rectification (whereby an owner's property rights in certain resources are transferred to a victim of the owner's tort, trespass, or aggression to compensate the victim). As respect for property rights is fundamental to maintaining a free and prosperous society, it follows that the freedom to contract to obtain, retain, profit from, manage, or dispose of one's property must also be upheld. Libertarians would free property owners from government restrictions on their rights to control and enjoy their property, as long as their choices do not harm or infringe on the rights of others. Eminent domain, civil asset forfeiture, governmental limits on profits, governmental production mandates, and governmental controls on prices of goods and services (including wages, rents, and interest) are abridgements of such fundamental rights. For voluntary dealings among private entities, parties should be free to choose with whom they trade and set whatever trade terms are mutually agreeable.

2.2 Environment

Competitive free markets and property rights stimulate the technological innovations and behavioral changes required to protect our environment and ecosystems. Private landowners and conservation groups have a vested interest in maintaining natural resources. Governments are unaccountable for damage done to our environment and have a terrible track record when it comes to environmental protection. Protecting the environment requires a clear definition and enforcement of individual rights and responsibilities regarding resources like land, water, air, and wildlife. Where damages can be proven and quantified in a court of law, restitution to the injured parties must be required.

2.3 Energy and Resources

While energy is needed to fuel a modern society, government should not be subsidizing any particular form of energy. We oppose all government control of energy pricing, allocation, and production.

2.4 Government Finance and Spending

Since all persons are entitled to keep the fruits of their labor, we oppose all government activity that consists of the forcible collection of money or goods from individuals in violation of their individual rights. We contend that a tax by any other name is still a tax and strive for the eventual repeal of all taxation. To further that end, we call for the repeal of the income tax, the abolishment of the Internal Revenue Service and all federal programs and services not required under the U.S. Constitution. We oppose the use of taxation as a punitive measure against certain goods or services, such as "vice" taxes, and oppose forcing employers to serve as tax collectors. We support any initiative to reduce or abolish any tax, and oppose any increase on any tax or creation of any new tax for any reason. To the extent possible, we advocate that all public services be funded or allowed to be provided in a voluntary manner.

2.5 Government Debt

Government should not incur debt, which burdens future generations without their consent.

We support the passage of a "Balanced Budget Amendment" to the U.S. Constitution,
provided that the budget is balanced exclusively by cutting expenditures, and not by raising
taxes. Government debt is wholly illegitimate, as it burdens the people without their consent.

We support repudiating all government debts at all levels as a means of both relieving unjust
financial burdens and limiting the growth of government.

2.6 Government Employees

We favor repealing any requirement that one must join or pay dues to a union as a condition of government employment. We advocate replacing defined-benefit pensions with defined-contribution plans, as are commonly offered in the private sector, so as not to impose debt on future generations without their consent.

2.7 Money and Financial Markets

We favor free-market banking, with unrestricted competition among banks and depository institutions of all types. Markets are not actually free unless fraud is vigorously combated. Those who enjoy the possibility of profits must not impose risks of losses upon others, such as through government guarantees or bailouts. We support ending federal student loan guarantees and special treatment of student loan debt in bankruptcy proceedings. Individuals engaged in voluntary exchange should be free to use as money any mutually agreeable commodity or item. We support a halt to inflationary monetary policies and unconstitutional legal tender laws.

2.8 Marketplace Freedom

Libertarians support free markets. We defend the right of individuals to form commercial enterprises based on voluntary association. We oppose all forms of government subsidies and bailouts to business, labor, or any other special interest. Government should not compete with private enterprise. We reject government charter of corporations. We call for a separation of business and state.

2.9 Licensing

Libertarians support the right of every person to earn an honest and peaceful living through the free and voluntary exchange of goods and services. Accordingly, we oppose occupational and other licensing laws that infringe on this right or treat it as a state-granted privilege. We encourage certifications by voluntary associations of professionals.

2.10 Sex Work

The Libertarian Party supports the decriminalization of prostitution. We assert the right of consenting adults to provide sexual services to clients for compensation, and the right of clients to purchase sexual services from consenting sex workers.

2.11 Labor Markets

Employment and compensation agreements between private employers and employees are outside the scope of government, and these contracts should not be encumbered by government-mandated benefits or social engineering. We support the right of private employers and employees to choose whether or not to bargain with each other through a labor union. Bargaining should be free of government interference, such as compulsory arbitration or imposing an obligation to bargain.

2.12 Education

Education is best provided by the free market, achieving greater quality, accountability, and efficiency with more diversity of choice. Recognizing that the education of children is a parental responsibility, we would restore authority to parents to determine the education of their children, without interference from government. Parents should have control of and responsibility for all funds expended for their children's education.

2.13 Health Care

We favor a free market health care system. Medical facilities, medical providers, and medical products (including drugs) must be freely available in the marketplace without government restrictions or licenses. We recognize the freedom of individuals to determine the level of health insurance they want (if any), the level of health care they want, the care providers they want, the medicines and treatments they will use and all other aspects of their medical care, including end-of-life decisions. People should be free to purchase health insurance across state lines. We oppose governments either mandating, or restricting voluntary access to, medical treatments or procedures including vaccines. Individuals have a presumption of health and

should not be subjected to forced quarantine, isolation, or other restrictions of their rights and freedoms.

2.14 Retirement and Income Security

Retirement planning is the responsibility of the individual, not the government. Libertarians would phase out the current government-sponsored Social Security system and transition to a private voluntary system. The proper and most effective source of help for the poor is the voluntary efforts of private groups and individuals. We believe members of society will become even more charitable and civil society will be strengthened as government reduces its activity in this realm.

2.X Agorism

We affirm the right of individuals and businesses to peacefully subvert government regulation, taxation, and restrictions through black and gray market activity.

2.X Intellectual Property

As we believe that ideas are not property, we favor the repeal of intellectual property laws but oppose fraudulent misrepresentation about goods and services. Disputes between inventors, creators, authors, artists, businesses and other such entities should be resolved according to principles of any contractual obligations between the parties involved.

3.0 SECURING LIBERTY

In the United States, constitutional limits on government were intended to prevent the infringement of individual rights by those in power. The only proper purpose of government, should it exist, is the protection of individual rights. The principle of non-initiation of force should guide relationships between governments.

3.1 National Defense

We support the maintenance of a sufficient military to defend the United States against aggression. We oppose the existence of a standing government military as a threat to peace and security. In the meantime, we support a policy of armed neutrality and oppose the stationing of military assets inside foreign territory. The United States should both avoid entangling alliances and abandon its attempts to act as policeman for the world. We oppose any form of compulsory national service. We believe in honoring our veterans by crafting and implementing policies to end aggression, undeclared wars, invasions, and occupations, while recognizing the difference between veterans and the policies they are sent out to implement.

3.2 Internal Security and Individual Rights

Individual rights shall not be curtailed, whether based on circumstances of war, epidemic, natural disaster or emergency, or any other pretense. Intelligence agencies that legitimately seek to preserve the security of the nation must be subject to oversight and transparency. We oppose the government's use of secret classifications to keep from the public information that

it should have, especially that which shows that the government has violated the law. We oppose the use of torture and other cruel and unusual punishments, without exception.

3.3 International Affairs

American foreign policy should emphasize peace with all nations, entangling alliances with none. We would end the current U.S. government policies of foreign intervention including military and economic aid; tariffs; economic sanctions; aggressive war, invasion, and occupation; and regime change. We recognize the right of all people to resist tyranny and defend themselves and their rights. We condemn the use of force, and especially the use of terrorism, against the innocent, regardless of whether such acts are committed by governments or by political or revolutionary groups.

3.4 Free Trade and Migration

We support the removal of governmental impediments to free trade. Political freedom and escape from tyranny demand that individuals not be unreasonably constrained by government in the crossing of political boundaries. Economic freedom demands the unrestricted movement of human as well as financial capital across national borders.

3.5 Rights and Discrimination

Libertarians embrace the concept that all people are born with certain inherent rights. We reject the idea that a natural right can ever impose an obligation upon others to fulfill that "right." We uphold and defend the rights of every person, regardless of their race, ethnicity, or any other aspect of their identity. Government should neither deny nor abridge any individual's human right based upon sex, wealth, ethnicity, creed, age, national origin, personal habits, political preference, or sexual orientation. Members of private organizations retain their rights to set whatever standards of association they deem appropriate, and individuals are free to respond with ostracism, boycotts, and other free market solutions.

3.6 Representative Government

We staunchly defend the rights to petition the government for redress of grievances and to express dissent. These rights are thwarted when government acts behind closed doors. We support election systems that are more representative of the electorate at the federal, state, and local levels, such as proportional representation, alternative voting systems, and explicit inclusion of "none of the above" on all ballots. As private voluntary groups, political parties should be free to establish their own rules for nomination procedures, primaries and conventions. We call for an end to any tax-financed subsidies to candidates or parties and the repeal of all laws that restrict voluntary financing of election campaigns. We oppose laws that effectively exclude alternative candidates and parties, deny ballot access, gerrymander districts, or deny the voters their right to consider all alternatives. We advocate initiative, referendum, recall, repeal, and oppose any effort to deny these options when used as popular checks on government.

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3.7 Self-Determination

Whenever any form of government becomes destructive of individual liberty, it is the right of the people to alter, abolish, or withdraw from it, and to agree to such new governance, or none, as to them shall seem most likely to protect their liberty. We recognize the right to political self-determination, including secession. Exercise of this right does not require permission from others.

3.X Separation of Federal, State, and Local Governments

We support the untangling of the layers of government from each other, including removal of mandates, subsidies, and commandeering, such that federal, state, county, municipal, and district governments are separate and independent from each other, in both function and funding, in order to facilitate their reduction or repeal. We support the nullification of unjust laws.

4.0 OMISSIONS

In every matter, we advocate the consistent application of the principle of the non-initiation of coercion, physical force, or fraud. Our silence about any other particular government law, regulation, ordinance, directive, edict, control, regulatory agency, activity, or machination should not be construed to imply approval.



Appendix F – Audit Committee Report

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Audit Committee Report

May 24, 2024

Requirements:

Libertarian Party Bylaws, Article 9:

Financial statements of the Party shall be prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). Audits shall be performed annually by an independent auditor. The non-officer members of the National Committee shall appoint a standing Audit Committee of three members with power to select the independent auditor. One member shall be a non-officer member or alternate of the National Committee and the other two shall not be members or alternates of the National Committee. The Assistant Treasurer is not eligible to serve on the Audit Committee. The Audit Committee shall present its findings to each regular convention and clarify for the National Committee any recommendations made by the auditor.

Policy Manual, Section 1.04(4)

The Audit Committee's tasks are to select an independent audit company and to direct the scale and scope of standard annual audits of the Party's accounting records and processes. Following receipt of the audit company's report, the Committee shall help the LNC interpret the audit results and assist the latter in preparing any action plans that might be needed to alleviate deficiencies.

2022 Audit

The audit was concluded in Fall of 2022, by Frye and Company CPAs.

In the unqualified opinion of the auditor, the 2022 financial statements present fairly the LNC's financial position. An unqualified opinion is the highest level of assurance that an auditor will give.

2022 Year End Revenue was 2,083,542 and Expenses were 2,010,837 for a change in net assets of \$72,705.

Four adjusting entries were made during the audit, resulting in a decrease in net assets of approximately \$6,200.

In the Management Letter, the auditor recommended a review of internal controls and segregation of duties due to the departure of key management staff.

The Audit Committee reviewed each of these recommendations in detail and can report that all have been addressed through the hiring of our outside accounting firm (Veracity Pros), and the engagement of a Digital Mail Provider (US Global Mail).

2023 Audit

The audit was conducted in March and April 2024 by Lehman Flynn Vollaro CPA's. In addition, the tax form was filed in a timely manner by the CPA firm. In the past years tax forms were prepared in-house.

In the interest of best practices, the Audit Committee initiated a selection process and engaged a new CPA firm. The LNC had utilized the same firm since at least 2012 and it was deemed prudent to get a fresh look, considering turnover in key staff positions and a change in accounting processes.

In the unqualified opinion of the auditor, the 2023 financial statements present fairly the LNC's financial position. An unqualified opinion is the highest level of assurance that an auditor will give.

2023 Year End Revenue was 1,131,567 and Expenses were 1,246,579 for a change in net assets of \$-115,012.

One adjusting entry was made during the audit. The March 2024 payment for the 2022 audit was adjusted to year 2023 as the expenditure was accrued in 2023. Pursuant to accrual accounting, the method utilized by the LNC, expenditures must be recorded when the expense is incurred (this differs from cash accounting in which expenses are recorded when paid).

No issues were identified in the Management Letter.

The CPA firm was complimentary on the existing practices and procedures implemented by the outside accounting firm. Accordingly, no follow-up by the Audit Committee is necessary.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether
 due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks.
 Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and
 disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Libertarian National Committee's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Libertarian National Committee's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Note A – Organization & Nature of Activities

Organization: The Libertarian National Committee, Inc. (the Committee) was founded in 1971 as a national, tax-exempt political organization which is the operational arm of the Libertarian Party, a grassroots political organization. The Committee was incorporated in February 1995 and its affairs are directed by its National Board of Directors, who are elected by delegates biennially at the national convention. The Committee, with the consent of the delegates, also establishes the platform of the Libertarian Party, which is based upon the basic premises of civil liberties and personal freedom, a free-market economy, free trade, and a foreign policy of non-intervention and peace. The Committee has approximately 16,000 contributing members.

<u>Programs</u>: The Committee's program activities consist of affiliate support, which comprises developing or supporting state and county affiliate parties; ballot access, which comprises getting candidates on ballots and includes corresponding lawsuits required to accomplish such; brand development, which is the process of developing an image in the minds of voters; campus outreach, which represents campus recruiting and support groups; candidate support, which comprises recruiting and supporting candidates with their electoral ambitions; litigation support, which includes proactive lawsuits to change public policy, other than ballot access; lobbying, which includes efforts to persuade legislators to change laws, including ballot access laws; media relations, which consists of direct communication with the media; member communications, which is comprised of the Libertarian Party News periodical and other member communications; outreach, which includes initiatives to reach the general public and outside groups; and voter registration, which consist of voter registration campaign initiatives.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting and Presentation: The Committee prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting. Consequently, revenue is recognized when earned and expenses when obligations are incurred. The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total and not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Committee's financial statements as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021, from which the summarized information was derived. Certain prior year information was reclassified to adhere with the current financial statement presentation.

<u>Income Tax Status</u>: The Committee is recognized as a tax-exempt political organization under Section 527 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Under IRC Section 527, the Committee's exempt functions include all activities that relate to and support the process of influencing or attempting to influence the selection, nomination, election, or appointment of any individual to a public or political office.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

<u>Income Tax Status - Continued</u>: Certain activities unrelated to the exempt purpose, such as net investment income, are subject to taxation. During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee incurred no significant income tax expense on its net investment income, which was under the specific deduction amount of \$100 available on Form 1120-POL. Although the Committee has not received any notice of intent to examine its tax returns, the Committee's tax returns remain subject to examination by tax authorities pursuant to various statutes of limitation. The Committee is also subject to oversight by the Federal Election Commission.

Revenue Recognition: Contributions and donations and bequests and legacies are recorded when received or when the unconditional promise-to-give is known at the earliest point determinable and measurable. They are recorded by the Committee as increases to its net assets without donor restrictions or to net assets with donor restrictions based upon the existence or lack of donorimposed restrictions. Any restricted amounts received and release from restriction in the same reporting period are reported as net assets without donor restrictions. Restricted resources from prior years in which the Committee meets the donor's restriction during the current year are reflected as net assets released from restrictions. Donated goods or contributed services meeting the requirements for recognition under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America are reported at fair value at the time of donation. The Committee treats membership dues as contributions and donations in the accompanying financial statements given that members receive de minimis benefits in exchange for their dues. Revenue from contributions and donations are recognized at the earliest point an unconditional promise-to-give is both determinable and measurable. Revenue from conditional promises-to-give are recognized as the donor or grantor's conditions are substantially met. Revenue from any program service activities and conventions and events are recognized when earned.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>: For financial statement presentation purposes, the Committee considers highly liquid debt instruments with maturities of three months or less, including money market funds, to be cash equivalents. The Committee periodically has cash balances in excess of federal insurance limits available for depository accounts.

Bequests Receivable: The Committee's bequests receivable consist of amounts due from decedent members' last wills and testaments. The most significant bequest pertains to a deceased member's unconditional promise-to-give the Committee a portion of the estate after liquidation of debts and payment of expenses. For bequests in excess of the annual contributions limits established by the Federal Election Commission (FEC) guidelines, the Committee may retain a trustee or escrow agent to hold the funds in trust for the benefit of the Committee. The trustee and escrow agent generally hold the funds in interest bearing accounts and annually release funds in amounts allowed by FEC rules and regulations. Any remaining funds held by the trustee or escrow agent are reported as bequests receivable. No significant bequests receivable were reported by the Committee as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

<u>Bequests Receivable – Continued</u>: Bequests receivables are reported at their net realizable value, which was determined by the Committee by initially discounting the initial bequest by an allowance for doubtful accounts and present value discount. Given the nature of the bequest and that the funds are being held in interest bearing accounts for the benefit of the Committee, the Committee determined that discounts for present value and collectability were unnecessary.

<u>Prepaid Expenses and Other Assets</u>: The Committee's prepaid expenses and other assets consist principally of prepaid rent, insurance, licenses, promotional supplies, and refundable deposits.

<u>Property and Equipment</u>: The Committee capitalizes property and equipment acquisitions at cost or fair value at time of donation and depreciates these items using the straight-line method of depreciation over their estimated useful lives, which range from approximately 3 to 5 years for furniture, equipment, and software and 15 to 39 years for building and related improvements. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance that do not extend the useful life of an asset, consumable supplies, and de minimis items are expensed as incurred. Depreciation and amortization expense was approximately \$36,000 and \$36,900, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021. No significant loss on the dispositions or impairment of property and equipment was reported by the Committee during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Net Assets: The Committee classifies its net assets based upon the existence or lack of donor-imposed restrictions. When the Committee receives contributions that are restricted by the donor or limited as to their use and the Committee has not met the donor's restriction by the end of the reporting year, then the Committee reports these amounts as net assets with donor restrictions. Restricted net assets in which the Committee has met the donor's stipulations during the fiscal year are reflected as net assets released from restrictions in the accompanying financial statements. Any restricted amounts received and released from restriction in the same reporting period are reported as net assets without donor restrictions. The components of the Committee's net assets are as follows:

- Without donor restrictions Represents unrestricted resources that are available to support
 the Committee's operations at the discretion of the Board of Directors and management.
- With donor restrictions Represents amounts received and restricted by donors to support specific Committee programs and initiatives, such as the building fund, ballot access, candidacy initiatives, and college campus programs. Net assets with donor restrictions are released from restriction either by the passage of time or by the Committee meeting the donors' stipulations. The Committee reported net assets with donor restrictions of approximately \$7,700 and \$85,800, respectively, as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, earmarked by the original donors for specific initiatives.

Note B – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies – Continued

Contributions and Donations: Contributions and donations are recognized at fair value in the period in which an unconditional promise-to-give is known or when a contribution is received, at the earliest point the contribution is both determinable and measurable by the Committee. Contributions are recognized as revenue and support without donor restrictions or with donor restrictions based upon the existence or lack of donor-imposed restrictions. Contributions and donations with donor-imposed restrictions in which the Committee has met the donor's stipulations are reflected as net assets released from restrictions. Revenue and support with donor restrictions in which the Committee met the donor-imposed restriction during the same fiscal year as the contribution are reflected as revenue and support without donor restrictions. Conditional promises-to-give are recognized when the conditions set forth by the donor are substantially met.

<u>Intentions-to-Give</u>: The Committee receives commitment cards from members who many times provide their credit card information for future contribution purposes. The members are generally making recurring contributions to the Committee and do not commit to a specific number of payments or period of time for which the Committee may charge the recurring gifts. The members may also decline the charges or request that the Committee cease making charges against their credit card at any time and completely at their discretion. The Committee treats these recurring contributions as intentions-to-give or conditional promises to give and as such, revenue is not recognized until the contribution is both determinable and measurable, which generally occurs when the credit card is processed and receipt received by the Committee.

Fair Value Measurements: The Committee established a reporting framework for measuring and disclosing fair value measurements. Fair value measurement disclosures are required for assets and liabilities measured and reported at fair value in the accompanying financial statements. The Committee determines fair value using a hierarchy based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the measurement with Level 3 being the lowest recognized level. The Committee attempts to maximize the use of observable inputs (Level 1 and 2) and minimize unobservable inputs (Level 3). Accordingly, the Committee would classify financial instruments measured at fair value in any of the following categories: Level 1, which refers to instruments traded in an active market, Level 2, which refers to instruments not traded on an active market but for which observable market inputs are readily available or Level 1 instruments where there is a contractual restriction, and Level 3, which refers to instruments not traded in an active market and for which no significant observable market inputs are available. As of December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee determined that no significant assets or liabilities were reported at fair value on a recurring basis in the accompanying financial statements. Disclosures about estimated fair values and fair value measurements were determined by the Committee based upon pertinent market data and other information available as of December 31, 2022 and 2021. Considerable judgment may be necessary to interpret market and financial data and to develop fair value measurements in certain circumstances. The Committee's estimates of fair value may not be indicative of amounts realized at disposition.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

<u>Financial Instruments and Credit Risk</u>: The Committee manages its concentration risk by placing its cash, savings, and money market accounts with financial institutions believed to be creditworthy. The Committee may periodically have cash balances in excess of federal depository insurance or hold funds in uninsured cash sweep or money market funds. To date, the Committee has not experienced any significant losses on these depository accounts. Credit risk associated with any contribution receivables or promises-to-give is considered to be limited due to historical collection rates and given the historical credit worthiness of the Committee's customers and grantors, which include local jurisdictions, parents, and concerned citizens.

<u>Advertising Costs</u>: The Committee expenses advertising and fundraising costs as incurred. No significant advertising or fundraising costs were deferred as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 and no significant advertising costs were reported by the Committee during the years then ended.

<u>Functional Allocation of Expenses</u>: The Committee summarizes the cost of providing its various programs and activities on a functional basis in the accompanying financial statements. Accordingly, certain expenses were allocated to the program and supporting services benefited as reflected in the statement of functional expenses. Expenses are allocated on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied by management. Expenses that are allocated include compensation and benefits, which are allocated based upon estimates of time and efforts devoted to the functional categories, while joint costs are allocated based upon the percentage of communications devoted to functional categories. Significant estimates are required to functionally allocate expenses and to allocate joint costs to the program and supporting services benefited.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates and the difference could be material.

Note C – Concentration of Risk

<u>Cash Balances</u>: Financial instruments that subject the Committee to potential concentrations of risk consist of cash balances with banking institutions that exceed the federal insurance limits. As of December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee reported no significant bank balance in excess of federal insurance limits.

<u>Contributions</u>: During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee's largest donor gave approximately \$36,500 (or 2%) and \$146,300 (or 7%), respectively, of the Committee's total revenue and support. Form time-to-time, the Committee is also a named beneficiary in a decedent's estate and may receive significant bequests.

Note D - Related Party Transactions

During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee received approximately \$18,500 and \$32,800, respectively, in contributions and dues from board members and employees. In addition to the contributions and membership dues from current and former board members and key employees, these individuals also volunteer to serve the Committee and in various capacities. Additionally, the Committee paid \$173,500 and \$92,900, respectively, to related state affiliates for ballot access petitioning and voter registration campaigns and related travel reimbursements to key employees during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Note E - Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The following schedule reflects the Committee's financial assets as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 reduced by amounts not available for general use due to contractual or donor-imposed restrictions within one year of the fiscal years ended December 31:

As part of the Committee's liquidity management, management may invest any excess funds in short-term investments, such as bank savings or market funds.

Note F - Bequests Receivable

From time-to-time the Committee receives bequests and legacies from decedent members' last wills and testaments. As of December 31, 2022 and 2021, management was unaware of any remaining outstanding bequest or significant pledge receivables. Bequests, similar to contributions and donations, are recognized at the earliest point known and measurable. The Committee reports bequests receivable at its net realizable value by discounting the initial bequest for an allowance for doubtful accounts and present value discount.

Note F - Bequests Receivable - Continued

Bequests and legacies in excess of FEC annual contributions may be held by trustees or escrow agents who hold generally hold any excess funds in interest bearing accounts generally mitigating the necessity of any significant discounts being applied by the Committee. No significant remaining bequests receivable were reported as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

Note G - Lines of Credit

Secured Line of Credit: In April 2022, the Committee established a \$200,000 secured line of credit with a regional financial institution. The line of credit is secured by the Committee's headquarters with interest accruing at a variable interest rate tied the lenders prime interest rates, which was approximately 7.5% as of December 31, 2022. The secured line of credit requires monthly payment of interest and matured in April 2023. No significant outstanding balance was reported on the secured line of credit by the Committee as of December 31, 2022. Interest incurred on the secured line of credit totaled approximately \$200 during the year ended December 31, 2022.

<u>Unsecured Lines of Credit</u>: The Committee maintains two unsecured lines of credit with financial institutions in the form of business credit cards. The business credit cards have total available credit of \$103,000 as of December 31, 2022 and require monthly payments of interest at annual rates that range from approximately 11% and 13% as of the year then ended. The Committee reported no significant outstanding balances on the lines of credit as of December 31, 2022 and 2021. Interest expense incurred on the unsecured lines of credit totaled approximately \$100 and \$20, respectively, during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021. The lines of credit are revolving and subject to restrictions and annual renewals and call provisions of the lenders. The terms and balances owed on the lines of credit are as follows as of December 31, 2022:

Unsecured lines of credit with regional financial institutions in the form of credit card accounts with total available credit of \$103,000. The lines are guaranteed by the authorized users and carry variable interest rates tied to the lenders' prime rates, which were approximately 11% and 13%. The Committee reported no significant outstanding balances as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 with interest expense of approximately \$-0- and \$20, respectively, during the years then ended. The lines of credit are revolving and subject to borrowing restrictions and annual renewal provisions.

The Committee reported no significant future maturities on the lines of credit as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and interest expense incurred on the lines of credit totaled approximately \$300 and \$20, respectively during the years then ended.

Note H - Debt Obligations

Mortgage Payable: In April 2014, the Committee entered into a \$500,000 secured promissory note with a regional financial institution to purchase the Committee's office headquarters. The promissory note is collateralized by underlying real property and improvements and a security interest in all depository accounts held with the financial institution. The secured note payable requires 119 monthly payments of principal and interest of approximately \$2,900 beginning in August 2014 at an annual fixed interest rate of 4.85%. The mortgage also requires a final balloon payment due in July 2024 that was originally projected to be approximately \$371,600; however, the Committee paid off the original mortgage in January 2021.

Note I - Net Assets with Donor Restrictions

The Committee's net assets with donor restrictions consist of funds earmarked by donors for the Committee's building fund, college campus programs, and legal defense and radio advertising initiatives. The Committee's net assets with donor restrictions and changes in net assets with donor restrictions consist of the following as of December 31, 2022 and 2021:

Note J – Intentions-to-Give

The Committee receives commitments from members who many times provide their credit card information for future contribution purposes. The members are generally making recurring contributions to the Committee and do not commit to a specific number of payments or period of time for which the Committee may charge the recurring gifts. The members may also decline the charges or request that the Committee cease making charges against their credit card at any time and completely at their discretion. The Committee treats these recurring contributions as intentions-to-give or conditional promises to give and as such, revenue is not recognized until the contribution is both determinable and measurable, which generally occurs when the credit card is processed and receipt received by the Committee. During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee recognized approximately \$618,000 and \$584,300, respectively, from recurring contributions from members.

Note K - Retirement Plan

The Committee maintains a 401(k) defined contribution retirement plan that covers employees who meet certain minimum age and length of service requirements. As a qualified retirement plan, employees may contribute a portion of their salaries on a tax-deferred basis up to statutory limits. The Committee has elected to make matching contributions to the plan based upon 50% of employee contributions up to 6% of the participant's qualified salary. The Committee incurred matching contributions and plan administrative expenses totaling approximately \$12,300 and \$15,200, respectively, during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Note L - Commitments & Contingencies

<u>Litigation and Disputes</u>: The Committee is currently involved in several lawsuits stemming primarily from presidential candidacy, state ballot and debate access. These suits involve various legal actions, claims and disputes with affiliates that arise from the normal course of business and that, in the opinion of management, will not have significant impact upon the Committee.

Membership Commitment: The Committee provides nominal or token promotional items to contributors and members, such as a periodic newsletter designed to keep members informed of current developments, encourage participation in the political processes, and to promote the interests of the Committee and its candidates. Although there is no contractual or legal requirement for the Committee to provide such services, as a part of its purpose and out of courtesy to its contributors, the Committee is committed to providing timely information and promotional items to its members. The Committee recognizes expenses on these programs and items as incurred and, as such, no liability is accrued for any implied member commitment.

Note L - Commitments & Contingencies - Continued

Federal Regulation: The Committee is subject to federal and state election laws and oversight by the Federal Election Commission (FEC). The Committee is subject to the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002 (BCRA), and various FEC and IRS regulations. As such, the Committee is required to file monthly and annual reports with the FEC regarding contributions and expenditures of its funds. Additionally, the Committee is precluded from receiving contributions from corporations, labor unions, and certain other third parties, and contributions received from individuals are limited to annual amounts as determined by the FEC, which was \$36,500 for each of the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021. Furthermore, the Committee's books and records are subject to examination by regulatory bodies and such examinations can result in fines, penalties, or sanctions. Although the results of such examinations have not had a material impact upon the Committee to date, no assurance can be given regarding the uncertainty of any future compliance examinations.

Employment Contracts: In July 2022, the Committee entered into an employment agreement with a new Executive Director. The employment contract provides for a base monthly salary, benefits, and performance incentives based upon financial and other performance indicators. The employment agreement provides for termination for cause and allows either party to terminate the agreement with a one-week written notice without any severance or liquidating damages.

<u>Hotel Contracts</u>: The Committee has contracts with hotels and other venues for conventions and other events. These contracts contain cancellation clauses that may require the Committee to pay certain liquidating damages in the event of cancellation. The amount of damages may vary depending upon the date of cancellation, numbers of rooms reserved, percentage of rooms resold by the hotel, cancellation and other insurance, etc. Also, in the event of cancellation, the Committee may also risk forfeiture of any deposits made with these hotels.

Note M – Income Taxes

Income Tax Status: The Committee is recognized as a tax-exempt political organization under Section 527 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Under IRC Section 527, the Committee's exempt functions include all activities that relate to and support the process of influencing or attempting to influence the selection, nomination, election, or appointment of any individual to a public office. Certain activities unrelated to the exempt purpose, such as net investment income, are subject to taxation as non-exempt income. During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Committee did not incur any significant income tax expense on its net investment income, which the Committee reported was under the annual specific deduction amount of \$100. The Committee is also subject to FEC rules and regulations and can be subject to penalties and assessment for noncompliance. No significant penalties or assessment were incurred by the Committee.

Note M - Income Taxes - Continued

<u>Tax Contingencies</u>: Although the Committee has not received any notice of intent to examine its tax returns, the Committee's tax returns remain subject to examination or review by tax authorities pursuant to various statutes of limitations. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Committee and to recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Committee has taken uncertain tax positions that would more likely than not be sustained upon examination. Management is unaware of any significant uncertain tax positions arising during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 that are more likely than not to be sustained should the Committee's tax returns be subject to examination. Accordingly, the Committee also did not incur or accrue any significant penalties or interest associated with uncertain tax positions during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Note N - Subsequent Events Evaluation

Management has evaluated subsequent events for the period January 1, 2023 through August 15, 2023, the date on which these financial statements were available to be issued and during this period, the Committee continues to operate under the novel coronavirus public health emergency as declared by the World Health Organization (WHO) and others. As such, there continues to be mandates from international, federal, state and local authorities requiring social distancing, travel and other public health requirements and restrictions. These requirements and restrictions continue to impact the manner in which business is conducted and could negatively impact the Committee's operations. While the closures and limitations on movement, domestically and internationally, are expected to be temporary, the duration of these disruptions, and related financial impact, cannot be estimated at this time. Management continues to evaluate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on its operations and while it is possible that the novel coronavirus could have a negative effect on the Committee, management is currently unable to determine the specific impact as of the date of these financial statements. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that might result from the outcome of this uncertainty.

We have completed our audit of the financial statements of the Libertarian National Committee, Inc. (The Libertarian Party) (referred to as "the Committee") as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the internal controls of the Committee in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal controls. Hence, our consideration of the Committee's controls was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the internal controls taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do *not* express such an opinion.

The Committee's Board of Directors and management are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control policies and procedures. The objectives of internal controls are to provide management with reasonable, not absolute, assurance in regards to the reliability of financial reporting, effectiveness and efficiency of operations, and compliance with applicable laws, regulations, contractual agreements, and donor stipulations and requirements.

Internal controls, no matter how well designed and operating, can provide only reasonable assurance to the achievements of an entity's control objectives. The likelihood of achievement is affected by limitations inherent in the controls, such as human error or mistakes in judgment, circumvention of controls by the collusion of employees or management override of internal controls.

Our consideration of the Committee's controls would not necessarily disclose all matters that might be a control deficiency under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA). A control deficiency is a condition in which the design or operation of internal control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected in a timely basis.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

As a result of our audit, we noted a significant deficiency and other matter involving internal control and its operation. Significant deficiencies are less severe and scope and materiality than material weaknesses but yet important enough to warrant management's attention and consideration. Our comments and recommendations reflect our commitment to provide our clients with practical solutions and we hope they are taken in a spirit of cooperation.

COMMENTS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Strengthening Internal Control

Internal control is designed to safeguard assets and help deter or detect losses from mismanagement, fraud, waste, abuse or other irregularities. They should also be designed to protect management and staff as they carry out their assigned duties and functions. A fundamental element of a good system of internal control is the segregation of duties, which is based upon the premise that no one employee should have access to both physical assets and the related accounting records or to all phases of a transaction. Although the size and nature of the Committee's staff prohibits complete adherence with this principle, we believe the following practices should be considered to strengthen internal control and reduce the opportunity for fraud and misuse of Committee assets. Given recent turnover of key management positions, we want to reiterate the importance of the appropriate internal control and oversight and encourage management to be mindful of the following considerations:

- Mail should be opened by an employee not responsible for accounting and any receipts immediately restrictively endorsed and logged into a cash receipts journal.
- Cash receipts should be deposited in a timely manner, preferable daily, and reconciled with the cash receipts journal and detailed accounting records.
- Bank statements should be received unopened directly by the Committee's President or Treasurer and canceled checks and transfers reviewed for propriety.
- Consider having duplicate bank statements mailed directly to the President or Treasurer to
 ensure an independent review of bank statements and bank transactions.
- Bank accounts should be timely reconciled with any uncleared and unreconciled items reviewed by the Committee's President or Treasurer.
- Management should review original supporting documentation for all disbursements and non-recurring or non-routine disbursements should be closely scrutinized.
- Consider requiring two signatures on all checks or certainly for checks over an established threshold and signed checks should not be returned to the employee or individual submitting the vendor bills for payment.

Strengthening Internal Control - Continued

- Periodically reconcile any payroll tax deposits with the tax deposits reported by the IRS to
 ensure amounts are being fully credited to the Committee in a timely manner.
- Annually review insurance coverage and fidelity bonding for employees and management responsible for check signing responsibilities and ensure that insurance coverage is extended to third-parties or contractual relationships, when warranted.

Segregation of Duties

As previously noted and given turnover of key personnel, the individual previously primarily responsible for maintaining the Committee's accounting system and preparing financial statements also has the ability to make wire transfers from the Committee's bank account. Although there are some limited mitigating controls, this is a lack of segregation of duties that should be considered by the Committee. Unfortunately, for smaller organizations where staffing and costs prohibit complete segregation duties, we are required to continue to communicate the internal control weakness. We also previously noted that that the individual with access to the Committee's accounting system also has access to the donor database. As such, the potential exists that cash receipts and other deposits can be misappropriated and not timely detected. Accordingly, we recommend that management review access controls to the accounting system, donor database, and merchant accounts to ensure appropriate segregation of duties and a system of checks and balances. Generally, we recommend that the same individuals not have the ability to manipulate data in both systems. We also noted an instance where the same individual has both check signing authority and primary responsibility for financial accounting. We also noted that employees with access to the accounting system also make the bank deposits. As such, again we recommend that management review its accounting policies and procedures to ensure appropriate segregation of duties and a system of checks and balances.

Accounting for Leases

The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) has also issued new guidance on accounting for leases that will significantly impact the accounting for operating leases in that right to use assets and liabilities will be reflected in the statement of financial position (i.e., balance sheet). The current accounting requirements for capital leases are tantamount to the new reporting requirements but the reporting model for operating leases changes dramatically. The new reporting requirements were effective as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022 but no significant lease agreements were identified.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

Note 1 - Principal activity and significant accounting policies

Organization

The Libertarian National Committee, Inc. (the Committee) was founded in 1971 as a national, tax-exempt political organization which is the operational arm of the Libertarian Party, a grassroots political organization. The Committee was incorporated in February 1995 and its affairs are directed by its National Board of Directors, who are elected by delegates biennially at the national convention. The Committee, with the consent of the delegates, also establishes the platform of the Libertarian Party, which is based upon the basic premises of civil liberties and personal freedom, a free-market economy, free trade, and a foreign policy of non-intervention and peace. The Committee has approximately 16,000 contributing members.

The Committee's program activities consist of affiliate support, which comprises developing or supporting state and county affiliate parties; ballot access, which comprises getting candidates on ballots and includes corresponding lawsuits required to accomplish such; brand development, which is the process of developing an image in the minds of voters; campus outreach, which represents campus recruiting and support groups; candidate support, which comprises recruiting and supporting candidates with their electoral ambitions; litigation support, which includes proactive lawsuits to change public policy, other than ballot access; lobbying, which includes efforts to persuade legislators to change laws, including ballot access laws; media relations, which consists of direct communication with the media; member communications, which is comprised of the Libertarian Party News periodical and other member communications; outreach, which includes initiatives to reach the general public and outside groups; and voter registration, which consist of voter registration campaign initiatives.

Basis of accounting and presentation

The Committee prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting. Consequently, revenue is recognized when earned and expenses when obligations are incurred. Certain prior year information was reclassified to adhere with the current financial statement presentation.

Cash and cash equivalents

For financial statement presentation purposes, the Committee considers highly liquid debt instruments with maturities of three months or less, including money market funds, to be cash equivalents. The Committee periodically has cash balances in excess of federal insurance limits available for depository accounts.

Financial instruments and credit risk

The Committee manages its concentration risk by placing its cash, savings, and money market accounts with financial institutions believed to be creditworthy. The Committee may periodically have cash balances in excess of federal depository insurance or hold funds in uninsured cash sweep or money market funds. To date, the Committee has not experienced any significant losses on these depository accounts. Credit risk associated with any contribution receivables or promises-to-give is considered to be limited due to historical collection rates and given the historical credit worthiness of the Committee's customers and grantors, which include local jurisdictions, parents, and concerned citizens.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

Prepaid expenses and other assets

The Committee's prepaid expenses and other assets consist principally of prepaid rent, insurance, licenses, promotional supplies, and refundable deposits.

Bequests receivable

The Committee's bequests receivable consists of amounts due from decedent members' last wills and testaments. For bequests in excess of the annual contributions limits established by the Federal Election Commission (FEC) guidelines, the Committee may retain a trustee or escrow agent to hold the funds in trust for the benefit of the Committee. The trustee and escrow agent generally hold the funds in interest bearing accounts and annually release funds in amounts allowed by FEC rules and regulations. Any remaining funds held by the trustee or escrow agent are reported as bequests receivable. No significant bequests receivable were reported by the Committee as of December 31, 2023 and 2022. Bequests receivables are reported at their net realizable value, which was determined by the Committee by initially discounting the initial bequest by an allowance for doubtful accounts and present value discount. Given the nature of the bequest and that the funds are being held in interest bearing accounts for the benefit of the Committee, the Committee determined that discounts for present value and collectability are not unnecessary.

Property and equipment

The Committee capitalizes property and equipment acquisitions at cost or fair value at time of donation and depreciates these items using the straight-line method of depreciation over their estimated useful lives, which range from approximately 3 to 5 years for furniture, equipment, and software and 15 to 39 years for building and related improvements. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance that do not extend the useful life of an asset, consumable supplies, and de minimis items are expensed as incurred. Depreciation and amortization expense was approximately \$22,000 and \$36,000, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022. No significant loss on the dispositions or impairment of property and equipment was reported by the Committee during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Net assets

The Committee classifies its net assets based upon the existence or lack of donor-imposed restrictions. When the Committee receives contributions that are restricted by the donor or limited as to their use and the Committee has not met the donor's restriction by the end of the reporting year, then the Committee reports these amounts as net assets with donor restrictions. Restricted net assets in which the Committee has met the donor's stipulations during the fiscal year are reflected as net assets released from restrictions in the accompanying financial statements. Any restricted amounts received and released from restriction in the same reporting period are reported as net assets without donor restrictions. The components of the Committee's net assets are as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Represents unrestricted resources that are available to support the Committee's operations at the discretion of the Board of Directors and management.

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Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Represents amounts received and restricted by donors to support specific Committee programs and initiatives, such as the building fund, ballot access, candidacy initiatives, and college campus programs. Net assets with donor restrictions are released from restriction either by the passage of time or by the Committee meeting the donors' stipulations. The Committee reported net assets with donor restrictions of approximately \$1,700 and \$7,700, respectively, as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, earmarked by the original donors for specific initiatives.

Contributions and donations

Contributions and donations are recognized at fair value in the period in which an unconditional promise-to-give is known or when a contribution is received, at the earliest point the contribution is both determinable and measurable by the Committee. Contributions are recognized as revenue and support without donor restrictions or with donor restrictions based upon the existence or lack of donor-imposed restrictions. Contributions and donations with donor-imposed restrictions in which the Committee has met the donor's stipulations are reflected as net assets released from restrictions. Revenue and support with donor restrictions in which the Committee met the donor-imposed restriction during the same fiscal year as the contribution are reflected as revenue and support without donor restrictions. Conditional promises-to-give are recognized when the conditions set forth by the donor are substantially met.

Intentions to give

The Committee receives commitment cards from members who many times provide their credit card information for future contribution purposes. The members are generally making recurring contributions to the Committee and do not commit to a specific number of payments or period of time for which the Committee may charge the recurring gifts. The members may also decline the charges or request that the Committee cease making charges against their credit card at any time and completely at their discretion. The Committee treats these recurring contributions as intentions-to-give or conditional promises to give and as such, revenue is not recognized until the contribution is both determinable and measurable, which generally occurs when the credit card is processed and receipt received by the Committee.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition

We recognize revenue from sales of products and services when the performance obligations of transferring the products and providing the services are met. Special events revenue is comprised of an exchange element based upon the direct benefits donors receive and a contribution element for the difference. We recognize special events revenue equal to the fair value of direct benefits to donors when the special event takes place. We recognize the contribution element of special event revenue immediately, unless there is a right of return if the special event does not take place. All goods and services are transferred at a point in time

We recognize contributions when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or a notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier, and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

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Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

Functional allocation of expenses

The Committee summarizes the cost of providing its various programs and activities on a functional basis in the accompanying financial statements. Accordingly, certain expenses were allocated to the program and supporting services benefited as reflected in the statement of functional expenses. Expenses are allocated on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied by management. Expenses that are allocated include compensation and benefits, which are allocated based upon estimates of time and efforts devoted to the functional categories, while joint costs are allocated based upon the percentage of communications devoted to functional categories. Significant estimates are required to functionally allocate expenses and to allocate joint costs to the program and supporting services benefited.

Income taxes

The Committee is recognized as a tax-exempt political organization under Section 527 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Under IRC Section 527, the Committee's exempt functions include all activities that relate to and support the process of influencing or attempting to influence the selection, nomination, election, or appointment of any individual to a public or political office. Certain activities unrelated to the exempt purpose, such as net investment income, are subject to taxation. During the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Committee incurred no significant income tax expense on its net investment income, which was under the specific deduction amount of \$100 available on Form 1120-POL. Although the Committee has not received any notice of intent to examine its tax returns, the Committee's tax returns remain subject to examination by tax authorities pursuant to various statutes of limitation. The Committee is also subject to oversight by the Federal Election Commission.

Leases

Leases are classified as finance leases or operating leases, in accordance with the terms of the underlying lease agreements and ASC 842, "Leases." For both lease types, a right-of-use asset and a lease liability must be established at lease commencement and then reduced over the remaining lease term. There are currently no leases.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires us to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates, and those differences could be material.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications of amounts previously reported have been made to the accompanying financial statements to maintain consistency between periods presented. The reclassifications had no impact on previously reported net assets.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

Subsequent events

We have evaluated subsequent events through April 4, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 - Concentration of risk

Financial instruments that subject the Committee to potential concentrations of risk consist of cash balances with banking institutions that exceed the federal insurance limits. As of December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Committee reported no significant bank balance in excess of federal insurance limits.

Note 3 - Related party transactions

During the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Committee received approximately \$20,955 and \$18,500, respectively, in contributions and dues from board members and employees. In addition to the contributions and membership dues from current and former board members and key employees, these individuals also volunteer to serve the Committee and in various capacities. Additionally, the Committee paid \$24,230 and \$173,500, respectively, to related state affiliates for ballot access petitioning and voter registration campaigns and related travel reimbursements to key employees during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Note 4 - Liquidity and availability

We regularly monitor the availability of resources required to meet our operating needs and other contractual commitments. Financial assets available for general expenditure, that is, without donor or other restrictions limiting their use, within one year of the balance sheet date, consists of the following:

Note 5 - Lines of credit

The Committee maintains two unsecured lines of credit with financial institutions in the form of business credit cards. The business credit cards have total available credit of \$103,000 as of December 31, 2023 and require monthly payments of interest at annual rates that range from approximately 11% and 13% as of the year then ended. The Committee reported no significant outstanding balances on the lines of credit as of December 31, 2023 and 2022. Interest expense incurred on the unsecured lines of credit totaled approximately \$0 and \$100, respectively, during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022. The lines of credit are revolving and subject to restrictions and annual renewals and call provisions of the lenders.

Note 6 - Net assets with donor restrictions

The Committee's net assets with donor restrictions consist of funds earmarked by donors for the Committee's building fund, college campus programs, and legal defense and radio advertising initiatives. The Committee's net assets with donor restrictions and changes in net assets with donor restrictions consist of the following as of December 31, 2023 and 2022:

Note 7 - Intentions to give

The Committee receives commitments from members who many times provide their credit card information for future contribution purposes. The members are generally making recurring contributions to the Committee and do not commit to a specific number of payments or period of time for which the Committee may charge the recurring gifts. The members may also decline the charges or request that the Committee cease making charges against their credit card at any time and completely at their discretion. The Committee treats these recurring contributions as intentions-to-give or conditional promises to give and as such, revenue is not recognized until the contribution is both determinable and measurable, which generally occurs when the credit card is processed and receipt received by the Committee. During the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Committee recognized approximately \$516,588 and \$618,000, respectively, from recurring contributions from members.

Note 8 - Retirement plan

The Committee maintains a 40 l(k) defined contribution retirement plan that covers employees who meet certain minimum age and length of service requirements. As a qualified retirement plan, employees may contribute a portion of their salaries on a tax-deferred basis up to statutory limits. The Committee has elected to make matching contributions to the plan based upon 50% of employee contributions up to 6% of the participant's qualified salary. The Committee incurred matching contributions and plan administrative expenses totaling approximately \$7,450 and \$12,300, respectively, during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Note 9 - Commitments & contingencies

Litigation and disputes

The Committee is currently involved in several lawsuits stemming primarily from presidential candidacy, state ballot access. These suits involve various legal actions, claims and disputes with affiliates that arise from the normal course of business and that, in the opinion of management, will not have significant impact upon the Committee.

Membership commitment

The Committee provides nominal or token promotional items to contributors and members, such as a periodic newsletter designed to keep members informed of current developments, encourage participation in the political processes, and to promote the interests of the Committee and its candidates. Although there is no contractual or legal requirement for the Committee to provide such services, as a part of its purpose and out of courtesy to its contributors, the Committee is committed to providing timely information and promotional items to its members. The Committee recognizes expenses on these programs and items as incurred and, as such, no liability is accrued for any implied member commitment.

Federal regulation

The Committee is subject to federal and state election laws and oversight by the Federal Election Commission (FEC). The Committee is subject to the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002 (BCRA), and various FEC and IRS regulations. As such, the Committee is required to file monthly and annual reports with the FEC regarding contributions and expenditures of its funds. Additionally, the Committee is precluded from receiving contributions from corporations, labor unions, and certain other third parties, and contributions received from individuals are limited to annual amounts as determined by the FEC, which was \$36,500 for each of the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022. Furthermore, the Committee's books and records are subject to examination by regulatory bodies and such examinations can result in fines, penalties, or sanctions. Although the results of such examinations have not had a material impact upon the Committee to date, no assurance can be given regarding the uncertainty of any future compliance examinations.

Employment contracts

In July 2022, the Committee entered into an employment agreement with a new Executive Director. The employment contract provides for a base monthly salary, benefits, and performance incentives based upon financial and other performance indicators. The employment agreement provides for termination for cause and allows either party to terminate the agreement with a one-week written notice without any severance or liquidating damages.

Hotel contracts

The Committee has contracts with hotels and other venues for conventions and other events. These contracts contain cancellation clauses that may require the Committee to pay certain liquidating damages in the event of cancellation. The amount of damages may vary depending upon the date of cancellation, numbers of rooms reserved, percentage of rooms resold by the hotel, cancellation and other insurance, etc. Also, in the event of cancellation, the Committee may also risk forfeiture of any deposits made with these hotels.

Note 10 - Income taxes

Income tax status

The Committee is recognized as a tax-exempt political organization under Section 527 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Under IRC Section 527, the Committee's exempt functions include all activities that relate to and support the process of influencing or attempting to influence the selection, nomination, election, or appointment of any individual to a public office. Certain activities unrelated to the exempt purpose, such as net investment income, are subject to taxation as non-exempt income. During the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Committee did not incur any significant income tax expense on its net investment income, which the Committee reported was under the annual specific deduction amount of \$100. The Committee is also subject to FEC rules and regulations and can be subject to penalties and assessment for noncompliance. No significant penalties or assessment were incurred by the Committee.

Tax contingencies

Although the Committee has not received any notice of intent to examine its tax returns, the Committee's tax returns remain subject to examination or review by tax authorities pursuant to various statutes of limitations. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Committee and to recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Committee has taken uncertain tax positions that would more likely than not be sustained upon examination. Management is unaware of any significant uncertain tax positions arising during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022 that are more likely than not to be sustained should the Committee's tax returns be subject to examination. Accordingly, the Committee also did not incur or accrue any significant penalties or interest associated with uncertain tax positions during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated March 1, 2024. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Matters

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Organization are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during year. We noted no transactions entered into by the Organization during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them December differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimate affecting the financial statements was:

Management's estimate of the depreciable lives of furniture and equipment is based on the industry standards We evaluated the methods, assumptions, and data used to develop the depreciable lives in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a disagreement on a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated March 25, 2024.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management December decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Organization's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that December be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Organization's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Appendix AA – Head Teller's Report

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Head Teller's Report for the 2024 Libertarian National Convention

Michael Seebeck, Head Teller

The 2024 Libertarian National Convention went as well as it could considering some shortcomings that were faced in supplies and functionality. However, in the crunch of everything and considering the extraordinary and record-setting balloting that occurred in the Presidential nomination, the tellers performed amazingly well.

The Tellers:

Floor Counters were Mr. Latham, Mr. Montoni, Mr. Harlos, Ms. O'Brien, Mr. Sechrest, and Mr. Danke, with Mr. Seebeck as backup.

<u>Tallies</u>

LNC Secretary Harlos recruited tellers in advance of the convention and held two online training courses on how to work the tally spreadsheets. During those training classes, Mr. Seebeck explained the tally system in that one teller would receive the tally sheets and do a preliminary check with the Delegation Chair to make sure it was filled out correctly. Once the check was complete, the envelope was passed off to other tellers. One teller would input the data into the spreadsheet, then a second one would verify the inputs. Mr. Seebeck was monitoring the process and providing feedback on any noted discrepancies, of which there were three throughout the entire balloting process. One was fixed during the processing, one was fixed upon screen review, and the last one was fixed by the Secretary afterwards. None of the three discrepancies impacted any final outcomes.

Floor Counts

The convention floor was divided into six sections, partitioned by the walkways, with one counter per section. Mr. Seebeck was at the front of the floor with a calculator in hand. Each counter would count the Aye votes for their sections and give their totals to Mr. Seebeck, who entered them into the calculator and gave the final number to the Secretary

and Chair. The process was then repeated for the Nay votes, and then the Chair announced the final results.

Supplies

The tellers had to deal with some supply problems. There was a shortage of index cards for ballots, which was exacerbated by the multiple rounds of voting. Tellers had to manually cut ballots from white copy paper. There was also a shortage of manila envelopes for the combination of the tally sheets and ballots. Tellers recycled them as needed. The Canon printers supplied ran out of toner and had a strange propensity to refuse to print part of the tally sheets; it required the whole document of all the sheets to be printed.

Tellers Pit

Upon arrival on the convention floor, the Tellers Pit was set up incorrectly and in the wrong place, so Tellers had to adjust and move things around. Hotel staff was helpful in sorting it out, as were the A/V personnel. The corrected location required all Teller laptops and printers to be powered from a single outlet through a series of power strips and extension cords. It was also some distance from the main stage and the Secretary.

Platform Tokens

The Platform deletion tokens lacked instructions and need to be improved.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Supplies

Upon the earliest disclosure of the state delegation numbers, calculation of supply purchases should be made, the appropriate supplies purchased, and development of the ballots, envelopes, tally sheets, petitions, and spreadsheets to make that effort as complete as possible prior to the convention, so once setup commences in the Tellers Pit prior to convention, it will simply be a matter of unboxing everything and it is ready to go. The supply purchase determination is based on the delegate numbers, and a spreadsheet has been established to automatically calculate what is needed once the state delegation counts are input. The Head Teller has offered to receive those supplies, do the printing processes, and bring the completed supplies to the convention.

Those supplies will include the correct number of index cards and envelopes needed for ballots, the printing labels for the ballots and envelopes, a <u>non-Canon</u> printer to print everything, Platform Token drop boxes, extra toner, a set of file sorters to lay out the envelopes for each round, colored paper for the tally sheets for multiple rounds, cardstock

to print out platform deletion tokens, power strips and floor safety tape, and supplemental supplies of paper clips, scissors, tape, rubber bands, and pens.

The Tellers had to appropriate the manual paper cutter from the Credentials. A second one for either the Tellers or Credentials would alleviate that need.

Power

The Tellers Pit needs to have adequate power strips and outlets to ensure the Tellers have their laptops up and running. We made do the past few conventions with Teller-supplied power strips and extension cords.

Ballots

With foreknowledge of the state delegation counts, the ballot labels can be preprinted for each state, race, and round, and be attached to the ballot cards, which can also be properly sorted and associated with tally sheets and envelopes. Having that extensive setup completed in advance will greatly improve operations. The supplies spreadsheet calculations include ballot coverage for 5 rounds for all 6 races for the next convention, plus extras if necessary, so there should be little need to have to improvise the way the Tellers had to do with this convention.

Vote Spreadsheets

We introduced some automation to the vote spreadsheets to make error-checking faster and more efficient. It paid off as it gave immediate feedback to the Tellers if there was a problem with a delegation's tallies, which allowed for immediate audit of ballots to find any discrepancies and resolve them. The entire voting process became faster and much more efficient. The Head Teller, at the Secretary's request, has since tweaked the spreadsheets for LNC At-Large and Judicial Committee to accommodate the voting style for each of those races. However, adjusting the spreadsheets for the contingency of RCV may be a challenge. The Secretary suggested adding line toning to the spreadsheets to help differentiate between lines, as the two errors that did happen were from entering votes on the wrong line. That has been implemented. Write-ins tend to take up a lot of spreadsheet space, and they were moved to a separate sheet for a race when it was necessary. That practice now is for all races, with the exception of President Round 1. The spreadsheets have also been adjusted for At-Large and Judicial Committee to reflect the total number of ballots, and tabs have been added for sorting those results. The spreadsheets have also been adjusted to add lines for Tellers to add their initials for the states they either entered or checked.

Traffic around the Tellers Pit

Delegation chairs were to come up to the Pit to receive their envelopes, but it became apparent that their traffic flow caused some problems. It may be a good idea to coordinate with the hotel to have some stanchions on hand to facilitate the traffic flow and give the Tellers some space to hand out the envelopes efficiently.

There were many complaints about the level of people in the side aisles around the Tellers area blocking access of the delegation chairs to deliver their tallies and pick up their ballots. More aisle space there will resolve these problems.

Credentials Committee

One of the Tellers' duties is validating the signatures on nomination petitions, and there was some difficulty in doing so because it took some time to get the delegates list from the credentials committee. It would be very helpful for the Tellers to have read-only access to that list throughout the convention.

Floor Counts

The first floor count was an unmitigated disaster because the Chair was not aware of the counting process the Tellers had in play. It's best that the Chair be aware of the process in advance and let the Tellers handle it. The Head Teller was using a calculator to accumulate the vote tallies; a tally sheet will be used in the future and has been created for that prupose.

The Delegate buttons were a great help in doing the tallies. However, their color schemes in LP colors were similar to other non-Delegate buttons, which made it difficult to determine who was a Delegate at times. Doing the buttons in colors for both Delegates and Alternates that are both dissimilar to other buttons and stand out boldly, such as in bright neons, would greatly help the counting process.

Alternatively, bring back the traditional ribbons and have them be similarly bold.

Delegation Tally Sheets

NOTA was placed on the last line on the second page of the delegation tally sheets, which caused the most errors on the sheets from delegations forgetting to count them and include them. The delegation tally sheets have been modified to place NOTA at the top of the first page of tallies to make it more visible to the delegation chairs when filling out the sheet.

Platform Tokens

The Platform deletion tokens have been given instructions and updated.

Other

At times, it was difficult for tellers to keep up with what was going on with regular business. As Delegates themselves, that's important. It has been requested that a TV display of the big screens be provided so the Tellers can follow along.

Speech-to-text on the displays will help the Delegates as well because the acoustics of the floor were bad, making it very difficult to understand what was going on. That created excessive repetitive and unnecessary Points of Information which slowed down business. Plus it will help Delegates who are hearing-impaired.

Maybe have a ASL person?
